Joan's trip to India

As promised, Joan Seymour has sent this report on her recent visit to Rajasthan

I-CONNECT Friendship in India gave me the opportunity to further my ambition to use my nursing skills in an area of great need. Firstly this involved me returning to work in order to save up for my flight, accommodation and spending money. Thank you to all who helped me raise money for the charity by attending the events I arranged: coffee mornings, tie sale and evening of music at the Cricket Club with Joan Edmundson, the John Wrightson Band and friends. My husband and family had to be convinced that this was a dream I was determined to accomplish. Those who know me know that, when I make my mind up, very little will stand in my way. Of course, I was excited and scared by the prospect of my adventure. The trip was a very humbling experience. The folk I met were friendly and had a contentment about them sometimes missing in our society.

Whilst in India we set up our medical camps in villages where they had little or no medical care. Malnutrition is an ongoing problem and, unless witnessed at first hand, it is hard to imagine. The complications of malnutrition were treated with multi-vitamins and

children were wormed. Head lice, impetigo, ringworm, dry skin conditions and infected insect bites were most frequently seen. Of course there were cases of TB and undiagnosed HIV, particularly distressing to see in children. Sadly, our ability to support was limited; through interpreters the TB victims were advised to go to hospital. This is not an easy option because, whilst in hospital, the family must feed and look after their sick relative. The people associate hospital with death, of course advanced TB is a killer disease.

For a brief time we were able to offer some relief of symtoms. Also we were a source of great entertainment (no, I didn't sing) - these odd looking foreigners tending the sick and needy.

There was no evidence of toys or books yet the children and adults waited patiently to be seen, often for hours, without complaint. At the end of the day we gave out one balloon and sweet to the children. Their beaming smile and delight will stay with me for a long time. Where do I go from here? My support will continue if I can help a child gain a good education so as not to be condemned to a life of hunger and hardship. I am very happy to be reunited with my family and friends. As a healthy OAP I feel rich and very fortunate indeed!

Details from the Neighbourhood Watch Meeting held on Tuesday 9th of Feb. in the Parish Hall

Matters Arising from the Dec. meeting - 2.1 Alcohol Ban in Public Places (Sedgefield Village): - Chair of Res. Forum Julia Bowles informed the meeting that the Res. Forum had been advised by PC Todd that the Pub Watch Group does not operate in a formal way - there are no minutes or notes taken, they are really focussed on looking at their own pub issues. This was by way of an explanation as to why there had been no reply to the Forum's letter (to Pub Watch Group) about restricting alcohol in the streets. Julia also pointed out that there was a difference in the views of what a ban of drinking alcohol (in public places) in Sedgefield should mean, between the Res. Forum & the N/H/Watch Panel. Chair Ken Saiger stated that the Panel's Exec. had met and agreed formally that the only practical arrangement should be to exclude consumption of alcohol in all public areas except those already covered by a (Premises) Licence, with exceptions being allowed on specific events (e.g. Medieval Fayre etc.). He concluded by indicating that this matter was now considered closed from ongoing N/H/Watch business and wished Julia & the Res. Forum good luck in their endeavours to persuade our Town Council, local Police and the Publicans to agree to their proposals, much needed by residents.

4. Representative Reports: 4a) Community Force: Tim Spearey circulated his report and discussed in some detail the issues of disputes and inconsiderate behaviour in Cross Street, Spring Lane and Front Street referred to in his report. Tim's other report held back for Agenda Item 5.

4b) Crime Prevention Officer: Keith Lownds informed the meeting that crime in the village continues to be very low and that year on year all crime for our area is actually down by 4%, in particular burglary is very low. Keith indicated that Operation DARC (keeping a light on / making the property appear occupied) appears to have been successful across the borough this year.

4c) Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Neil Langthorne gave details of the new *Voice Connect* system which is now operational, but the e-mail capability for ring round type messages is not yet available due to a Police procedural requirement that needs resolution. The *Confidential Reporting Number* for our area to allow anyone to ring in and leave details of any matter of concern / observation / intelligence for which they do not want any response back to themselves is now available. The Confidential Reporting No. is: - 01325 742297. *Business Watch*, Neil informed members that all bar one company is signed up in Sedgefield. 5 Dog Fouling & Littering:

5.1 C/man Ken Saiger received Tim's report covering the period 07-29/01/2010 recording 5 reports of littering and 6 of Dog Fouling. Residents' (specific) complaints from the last Panel meeting had been dealt with eventually. However they had needed further complaints & requests to Tim (and his immediate manager) despite Tim having actioned them immediately following that Dec. meeting. Members felt this was most unsatisfactory but were very appreciative of Tim's efforts. Everyone at the meeting felt very strongly that the state of the village at present is quite disgusting and this is predominantly from dog fouling. This "state" has also been reported to the Town Council. C/man pointed out that when Tim was appointed to our village "the deal" when we obtained an office and a phone for him was that Tim would spend 75% of his time in Sedgefield itself; and yet again it is obvious that this is simply not happening. Tim was asked directly what is his allocated time for Sedgefield itself, he advised that it is one day in four i.e. 25% of his time. Secretary was actioned to write formally to Durham Council, expressing residents' anger over lack of service, adequate action following Tim's reporting, not honouring "no detriment" promise (made on Unitary authority changeover) and to request that Tim be allowed to spend at least 75% of duty in the village to tackle this serious problem once & for all. Tim was asked how many fines were issued in Sedgefield since last meeting - there were none, but he had issued 2 fines in Aycliffe. Tim did point out that there is a staff shortage & recruitment is to take place; however when asked he could not confirm whether overall numbers would be more, less or the same as before the organisation changeover. Despite whole sale dissatisfaction with this continued problem, members were at pains to let Tim know that they really do value his commitment and efforts for the village in the time that he is present.

5.2 Community College - Lunch Problems This was discussed again, Tim informing members he has talked with the College's responsible officer and it is accepted the problems still exist. Tim hopes to be issued with a "head-cam" which will be used by the school to finally identify the pupils who are causing the problems / nuisance. Members are appreciative but simply believe this will not happen for as already observed, Tim is simply not around enough hours in the village to sort this **and** the dog fouling problem.

PC Todd confirmed that teachers are in fact "out of school on a lunch time & around the village"; in a car to try and resolve this ongoing problem.

6. A.O.B. Julia Bowles who is one of the village representatives on "our" Area Action Partnership gave an update on their activities, for which the C/man thanked her. Meeting Closed (next meeting 13/04/10) & PACT opened

Operation Hatton 2010 Test Purchase

Ten off licensed premises were tested in an undercover operation on Friday evening, 12th February 2010. The operation involved a 14 and a 15 year old teenager, who with parental permission, visited off licensed premises in Sedgefield, Bradbury, Fishburn, Trimdon Village Trimdon Grange and Trimdon Colliery to see if they were able to purchase alcohol. This joint operation between Durham Police and Durham County Trading Standards Officers has been coordinated through the Safe Durham Partnership. The partnership is committed to promoting multi-agency working in tackling issues around the misselling or misuse of alcohol. As a result of the Police operation, only one premises failed, which was Bradbury Service Station in Bradbury. An £80 Fixed Penalty ticket was issued to a staff member Premises successfully challenging test purchasers were:

Trimdons: Sanders (Jacks), Church Rd, Trimdon Village; CO-OP, Church Road, Trimdon Village; Sue's, Redesdale Court, Trimdon Grange; Jordan's, Commercial St, Trimdon Colliery. Fishburn: CO-OP, Butterwick Road; Sanders (Billy's), Walden Terrace.

Sedgefield: Theakstons – Front St; Sainsbury's, Whitehouse Drive; CO-OP, High St.

Sergeant 919 Brian O'Connor, Sedgefield Neighbourhood Police Team: "Overall the operation was a resounding success. It confirms the good work being undertaken by the licensees in the areas licensed premises. Many premises visited, operated a robust challenging policy. One of the aims of the operation was also to reinforce the need for constant vigilance. Antisocial behaviour is often fuelled by alcohol, and it is important that as well as carrying out high visibility Police patrols in the area, we target the source in which the alcohol is being purchased from. We will continue Operations like this over the next few months in order to tackle anti-social behaviour in the area."

JOTTINGS from Sedgefield Residents' Forum February meeting

There was not the anticipated presentation regarding any planned repairs to village pavements, we will try to have information for the meeting in March. Replies are also awaited regarding information on the circa £47,000 which was allocated to the area as a result of the Cunningham Court development and the ongoing attempts to get clarification on planning issues. Again it is hoped to have updates for the March meeting.

It was very encouraging to hear from PC Todd that there had been very little crime in the village, hopefully that will continue. PC Todd welcomed the installation of the Youth Shelter in front of the Town Council office, those at the Forum hoped it would solve some of the anti-social behaviour problems experienced in other parts of the village and would reserve judgement until use of the shelter had been monitored for some months. However, it was highlighted that the shelter had been placed in the conservation area without any visible community consultation, and questions were asked as to why residents in the conservation area had such great problems with planning issues yet such structures as a Youth Shelter could just go ahead. Appreciation was given to the decision not to establish an entrance to East Park from Matfen Court, such an entrance had the potential to cause residents in that area considerable problems.

The Forum's representative on several health related panels gave a comprehensive update on Durham Link Health News and proposals for future health care in the area – things which are very relevant to our community. Discussion took place on the draft Town Plan being formulated by the Town Council (TC) and Sedgefield Together. The draft plan could be read on the TC web site and comments needed to be in by Feb 11th 2010. The Plan will then be launched at the next Together Forum meeting on March 22nd. General comments from the Residents' meeting were that the Plan needed really strong statements on the needs and wishes of the resident community about future development and protection of our surrounding countryside. As always the minutes of the meeting will be available in the Library and TC office at least one week before the next meeting which will be held on March 1st at 7.00pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall, all are welcome. Last month, I confidently predicted that the weather would improve and I'd have plenty more news from our Sunday league football teams. I do have a short update, but winter has continued to reign and play havoc with the local sporting calendar. In fact, I believe that Sedgefield is putting together a proposal for the International Olympic Committee, with a view to hosting the Winter Olympics in 2018. If the bid is successful, the event could be the start of a great double, as England's campaign to bring the FIFA World Cup to these shores is really starting to gather momentum.

Sedgefield Harriers

Ben Hetherington continued making strides of improvement with an excellent 14th place in the U15 boys for Sedgefield Harriers at the Northern Athletics Cross Country Championships in Blackburn at the end of January. Ben finished in 14 minutes and 1 second in a field of over 200 runners from clubs all over the north of England. The Harriers had a strong junior representation at the championships. Also in the U15 boys, promising runner Jack Snowden finished 100th in 15:35, Seb Reichel 153rd in 16:27 and Sam Hearmon 198th in 18:14. The U15 boys team was 19th overall. In the U13 girls, three athletes made their cross-country championships debuts; Ellie Gaines finished 196th in 15:57, Megan Hetherington 202nd in 16:23 and Emily Robertshaw 210th in 18:16. In the U15 Girls, Sam Hearmon ran an excellent race picking up places in the latter stages to finish strongly in 107th in 18:43. In the U13 boys, Rory Varley (despite losing his shoe in the mud!) finished 173rd in 14:33, Josh Hetherington 179th in 15:15 and

George Peden 180th in 15:20. In the U17 boys, Jonathan Baines, who had been unwell, unfortunately had to retire after one lap.

This was another good day for the Harriers, demonstrating the steady progress of the junior section. For a lot of the juniors competing, the day was about gaining experience and building confidence for improving on positions in future races. They will now go on to race in the National Cross Country Championships in Leeds on 27th February. With the breadth and depth of the junior section and experience gained, the Harriers are hopeful of top three placings in championships within a few years. Three seniors also competed over the tough course in Blackburn; Gary Hetherington, Ean Parsons and Peter Carden. Meanwhile, Jonathan Baines and Ben Hetherington have gone on to run well in the Durham Schools cross country championships and were picked to represent Durham Schools in an inter-counties match. As a result, Jonathan Baines has been selected to represent Durham Schools in the National Schools Championships in Manchester on the 20th March. Both Jonathan and Ben are pupils at the Community College. The Harriers have been represented at a number of road and trail races recently, including the York Brass Monkey Half Marathon, The Loftus Poultry Run (which had to be rescheduled due to snow) and the Anne Johnson Absent Friends race in Billingham. A number of members have also been racing in the North York Moors Winter Fell race series. For some runners training is now well under way for the London Marathon.

Congratulations to Kerryanne Everrett who has just completed a Running Leaders Course to become a level 1 coach. The club now has eleven qualified coaches working with juniors and seniors of all abilities. Finally, there's news of some great publicity for the Harriers. Junior Jonathan Baines has been selected by Athletics Weekly to be their Athlete of the Month for February and will have a full page feature in the publication read by athletes and coaches throughout the country. Sedgefield boxer Bradley Saunders has turned his focus on the London 2012 Olympic Games. After his experiences in Beijing, Bradley took the decision to remain in the amateur ranks, which means that he is still eligible to compete in the Olympics. He has won all of his 14 bouts since Beijing, but has also had to deal with an injury setback, after breaking his left thumb during a training camp in Milan last year. Rugby; special report

Paul Wilkinson is a player with Sedgefield District RUFC, a fledgling club still in its infancy. With the Six Nations here and everybody watching and talking about Rugby, he brings us this report on new Coach Mr Ted Wood, a great man of rugby and the very same man who won the Local Hero Award last year. There's information too about your local Rugby Team.

For 30 years Ted Wood has been synonymous with Durham University rugby. During that time a stream of talented players, such as Will Carling, Phil de Glanville, Will Greenwood and Charlie Hodgson, passed through the portals of the Racecourse Ground. Wood's decision to step down at the age of 71 represents the end of an era. So many owe him a huge debt. Greenwood described his contribution as "immeasurable" while Falcons England flyhalf David Walder said: "He's a legend. He's given me and the professionals the chance to make it."

Born in Barnsley, Wood was educated at Queen Elizabeth School, Wakefield, a rugby school where he got his first taste of the game that was to be his life. He played for the Army, Barnsley (aged 14), Wakefield, Sheffield and Blackheath, and taught at Tunbridge Wells. He said: "It didn't really fit a boy from Barnsley, I was not really equipped to teach in Tunbridge Wells, it was something of a culture clash." Whilst at Tunbridge Wells Wood played for Blackheath, at the time the biggest club in the country. But he was eventually attracted to Durham and appointed Academic Bursar at Hatfield College in 1974 with a role in the School of Education. Wood fondly describes Hatfield as "a very, very special college." In the 1974 UAU final, 14 of the Durham University team that played Loughborough were from Hatfield and the 15th from St Hild and St Bede.

Durham won the UAU (now the BUSA) title in 1965 and 1969, played in the final in 1973 and 1974 and after a 12 years of near misses, won four titles in five years. It was a time when county and international selectors haunted the Racecourse Ground. "People comment on the fact that I have never been paid," said Wood. "Well, you can't measure everything by money. I'm a lot richer than most people for that. There are people coaching in clubs who hate it, but it is their livelihoods, and that must be a terrible scenario."

Although player development has always been his credo, Wood has had his successes with Durham, with the North of England when they beat Australia at Otley and with the North in the Divisional Championship, England Students and Durham County. "Rugby was strong long before I came to Durham" he added. "Players get tired of the same guy doing the same things and I'm delighted to see Howie Nicholson and Phil Harvey in charge now - they know what they are doing."

Ted is now Coach at Sedgefield District Rugby Union Football Club. In his short time at Sedgefield, training numbers have doubled, new players come every week. We have gone from struggling to turn a team out to full squad training sessions. We now have substitutes every Saturday, which is a huge bonus and the envy of a lot of clubs in the league. We are now the Team to beat in the league. Although we will not get promoted this season as Ted joined a quarter of the way through, we will be hunting for promotion next season. The club has turned a corner and is heading in a new direction.

We train every Wednesday at Sedgefield College from 7.30, play at the School every other Saturday and have a Website and Facebook account. Sedgefield District RUFC is on the up, thanks to Ted.

More on dog fouling

I and many other people I have talked to, agree with the lady who spoke out about Dog Fouling in last month's Sedgefield News. Our village footpaths and grassed areas are littered with dog dirt, making walking with children or pushing a buggy constantly difficult. It is unbelievable that socalled Dog Loving owners can leave their dog's poo behind, when they can obtain Doggy Bags FREE from the Town Council office or Library (of course any bag would do!) Even the area on either side of the path across the show field seems to be regarded as a dogs' toilet. Can you imagine the germs that are present in these areas, together with toxocara worm eggs, if the dogs are not regularly wormed. The eggs can remain active for up to two or more years and re-infest other dogs or, if ingested by humans, particularly children, can cause blindness.

It makes me sad that people have the cheek to encourage their dogs to foul in view of elderly people's flats at Homebryth House. Do they not realise that this view may be all the residents see each day and watch this happening several times a day, every day. Maybe this would be a good viewpoint to take photographic evidence, of those owners who do not clear up after their dogs, for the County Council to prosecute.

It is a privilege to live in such a pretty village, with many grassed areas, some preserved for hundreds of years, not just to be used as a dogs toilet. I have noticed a woman regularly allowing her dog to foul on the village green in the same spot, at the same time each day, telling her children to go on to school while she cleans it up. This dog seems intelligent to regard this area as a place for it to perform; don't you think it could be trained to perform in their own

back garden instead? An incident happened to a three year old child in my care, the week the snow began to thaw. He is one of those children who loves to run and the heavy snow had prevented him doing so. When he saw the footpath before him, at last, clear of snow, he ran with excitement, slipping in one pile of dog poo then falling in another. He was covered and very upset. Now I ask you, does he have the right to use the footpath, or is it for what some dog owners leave behind? I am pleading with those dog owners who do not already do so, to pick up their dog's waste and

dispose of it responsibly. Then we will have a cleaner and healthier village for us all to enjoy.
