Teaching with a difference!

Alexander Priestley-Leach, from Sedgefield, a 17 year-old pupil at Carmel College, has secured a place with Project Trust to teach maths, science and English at a secondary school in rural Zambia for a year. This follows a five-day assessment and selection process on the Scottish island of Coll in 2015.

Project Trust is a registered charity specialising in sending volunteers abroad to teach and help in social care projects. Since being set up in 1967 it has sent well over 6,000 people overseas. Their main aim is to allow young people to experience a new culture and be able to make a difference both abroad and following their return to the UK.


As part of his volunteering, Alex wishes to raise £6,000 for the work that Project Trust does in supporting children's education in developing countries. Zambia is one of the poorest countries in the world and is home to 6 million children under the age of 18. Although Zambia has in recent years made progress in increasing access and gender parity, more than a quarter of a million children remain out of school (UNICEF).

Alex has started the mammoth task of fundraising by selling jam, selling cards, collecting clothes to sell for recycling and writing to charitable trusts for support. Over the next months he hopes to be packing supermarket bags, doing a sponsored row, running raffles and organising quizzes.

So far he has raised £3000. His next fundraising endeavour is Pie, Peas and Bingo at Ceddesfeld Hall on Saturday 12th March at 7.30pm (tickets £6 available from Alex, as detailed below).

Alex would appreciate any support such as raffle prizes, venues for events, or simply advice as well as, of course, direct financial contributions! He is more than happy to give talks to organisations either before or after his time volunteering.

Steve's Nature Diary

The natural world month by month

March is a good time to visit woodlands; not only are there fewer leaves on the trees so that birds are more easily seen, it is also a terrific time for English wild flowers. After a quiet start to the year in January and February, spring flowers seem to appear daily in most types of habitats. This is particularly true of woodlands, where spring flowers such as Bluebells and Wood Anemone carpet the woodland floor, before the leaf canopy closes over. In hedgerows, Blackthorn gleams white in leafless hedges and Greater Stitchwort (poor man's buttonhole) colour the hedge banks.

Wood Anemone grows in deciduous woods, by streams and canals, on hedge banks, in grassland and under bracken. It spreads by underground rhizomes, forms large patches and grows up to 30cm tall. The flowers are white (2-2.5cm across) but when you look closely you can see grey veins on the petals. Anemones are also known as windflowers because they flower in windy March. Greek legend has this flower springing up where Aphrodite's tears fell, as she wept over the death of her lover, Adonis. "Where streams his blood there blushing springs a rose, and where a tear has dropped, a windflower blows."

Another characteristic spring flower of woodlands, hedgerows, graveyards and parks is Lesser Celandine; its shiny flowers can carpet area with gold between March and May. Despite its name it is not actually a close relative of Greater Celandine but is a member of the buttercup family. Lesser Celandine is a low-growing plant with dark green, shiny, heart-shaped leaves and bright yellow flowers about 3cm across that open in the sunlight. These flowers take advantage of deciduous woods by flowering before leaf burst and add a touch of colour to a walk in March.

There are several good examples of reserves to see spring flowers, including Tees Valley Wildlife Trust's Saltburn Gill www.teeswildlife.org/nature-reserve/saltburn-gill and National Trust's Newton Wood at Newton under Roseberry. Durham Wildlife Trust's Hesleden Dene is another. This name derives from 'hesle', a corruption of hazel, in abundance there alongside ash and wych elm along with the spring flowers. The reserve also has exceptional natural exposures of Magnesian limestone eroded to produce impressive outcrops with many caves and fissures. Other woodland wildlife thrives with regular sightings of roe deer, fox, woodpeckers and tawny owl. To get to the reserve from the A19, take the B1281 towards Blackhall Rocks and turn right at the sign for Hesleden Village. Cross the Hart to Haswell cycleway and enter the reserve. Situated south of Hesleden Village, there is a small amount of parking in the lay-by at Station House at the south end of Station Road. Hardwick Park volunteer news by David Hall

As a recent volunteer at Sedgefield's Hardwick Park I have been asked to write giving my impressions. There are about 36 volunteers totalling an average of 522 hours per month (or 70 working days) which surprised and impressed me. The work seems to fall into three areas:

- 1. Gift shop and exhibition area. The item that sells the most is the bird food for the many wildfowl and other birds in the Park. The exhibition area describes the development of the Park over the last 260 years and volunteers are on hand to answer any questions.
- 2. Assisting education assistants in preparing for, and helping with, school visits; about 550 children, even in the wintry weather between November and January! They also helped prepare Santa's Grotto which attracted about 250 children and their parents.
- 3. Most volunteers, including myself, help the Park Rangers with outside maintenance. Since November this has taken many forms: erecting fencing and gates in East Park to improve grassland management; hedge laying and coppicing; painting memorial seats; ongoing maintenance of shrub beds; and litter picking, which enabled the Park to receive the Keep Britain Tidy Green Flag Award last October the only North East tourist attraction in the country's top 20 awards.

The latest initiative has been to help Rangers to create a bird hide and feeding station. All the following have been seen recently: kingfisher, long-tailed tit, reed bunting, nuthatch, tree creeper, goldfinch, bullfinch, sparrow hawk, siskin, great spotted woodpecker and lesser redpoll (in addition to the more common birds) as well as goosanders, cormorants, tufted duck etc on the lakes. I also enjoyed the end of year buffet in the wonderful Cafe and the fish & chip lunch around the bonfire which enabled me to meet other volunteers who work on different days and in different roles to myself. I find the Park a beautiful and interesting place in which to volunteer. I see fascinating birds, squirrels and spring flowers and enjoy a friendly chat to visitors. I can recommend a visit or to get involved as a volunteer.

Business Telephone Scam

Durham Constabulary is warning businesses of a telephone scam being operated in recent weeks which targets a company's telephone system using it to make numerous international premium rate calls costing the firm thousands of pounds.

The fraudsters usually strike when businesses are closed but their telephone systems are not. DC Jonathan Stoker from Durham Constabulary Cyber Crime team said, "The police are investigating the sources of the hacking," but in the meantime businesses should take the following precautions.

- Use strong pin/passwords for your voicemail system, ensuring they are changed regularly.
- Where possible, disable access to your voice mail system from outside lines
- If you do not need to call international numbers/premium rate numbers, ask your telecoms provider to place a restriction on your telephone line.
- Ask your network provider to block outbound calls at certain times e.g. when your business is closed.
- Ensure you regularly review available call logging and call reporting options.
- Regularly monitor for increased or suspect call traffic.

To report a fraud call Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or visit the Action Fraud website. North East business can also take advantage of free national and local support by joining CISP —CERT UK (Cyber-security Information Sharing Partnership)

2. It is with great delight that I can confirm that Eon have withdrawn their application to build wind turbines on the Isles. We have been battling this for many years and for a lot of that time, it felt like a hopeless task. On behalf of TICTAC I would like to thank the residents of Sedgefield as well as the parish council, John Robinson, Rachel Lumsden and Phil Wilson MP for their constant support. If you came to one of our meetings, stuck a poster up in your window, attended an exhibition, gave us money or wrote an objection letter, thank you. It was your support along with that of many other communities that meant we were able run a campaign that highlighted the complete unsuitability of the Carrs for this kind of development. Eon's original timetable would have seen the turbines built 2 years ago so the recent changes in subsidies would have come too late for us. Our success in delaying the application was only possible because of the work and support of so many people in our community as well as further afield.

A few months ago, Sedgefield News published its first 'young people's edition'. It was great to read so much in the way of positive news and views from the younger generation of Sedgefield. As it happened, on that particular month, most of the sports update was dominated by achievements by older folk. However, this page regularly features great sports news from the young people of Sedgefield and we only have to look around us to understand that we have a very active community. It won't be long now before the cricket season is upon us and Sedgefield Cricket Club's impressive junior section will be as busy as ever, while talented young cyclists like Ben Hetherington seem to be working hard in the saddle all year round and Sedgefield Youth FC continues to field competitive U11 and U15 teams in the TJFA League.

Meanwhile, the junior section of Sedgefield Harriers is making great strides (literally and figuratively) and the recently launched **Sedgefield junior parkrun** has already succeeded in helping hundreds of youngsters to get active on a Sunday morning (which in turn has motivated their parents to get out of bed early!)

Like the senior event, junior parkrun is a fantastic, welcoming – and free – phenomenon that gives 5-14 year olds an opportunity to run, jog or walk around a route around Hardwick Park in a very safe environment, at the same time every Sunday (9:00am). The Sedgefield event is one of only two in our region and attracts children from near and far, including boys and girls who compete in other sports and use parkrun as part of their fitness training.

All of the sports I have mentioned above take place outside and are very visible to dedicated supporters and passers-by alike, but the achievements of Sedgefield's sporting youngsters aren't limited to fresh air pursuits.

This month, I'm going to put the focus on one of our community's most talented young stars who is making huge progress with racket and ball ...

Squash

Budding local squash player, Jessica Weatherspoon has just graduated from the girls under 11 age category as reigning county and regional U11 champion, and officially ranked number three in the country. Jess, who plays at Sedgefield Squash Club and attends Sedgefield Primary School, started playing at the age of six at the club's Saturday morning junior sessions. Having got a taste for the game through coaching and internal club competitions, she entered her first County Closed Competition at the age of seven, in the U9 mixed category. Despite having to play against a large number of boys, her spirited approach to the game was

acknowledged by those watching. The next year she was able to compete in the U11 girls competition, again not being daunted playing against older competitors. In 2014, at the age of just nine, she became the County Closed Champion in this age category and started regularly entering national competitions.

Last year, Jess retained her U11 county title, in addition to winning the girls U13 title, and in what she describes as her squash highlight to date, she won the North East & Yorkshire regional U11 title in November. This, along with her competition successes saw her achieve her current ranking of number three in the country. These achievements have also led to a sponsorship from racket manufacturer, Harrow.

Jess has represented both her county and the region. In addition to playing for Sedgefield's junior club teams, she recently made her debut for the ladies team in the Durham & Cleveland County leagues.

Jess now moves on to the U13 category, an age group in which she has already played a number of competitions. As she continues to develop, it's a very good bet that there will be much more silverware to come. Watch this space!

High Hopes for Sophie



In just under six months time Sophie Smart will set out on what she describes as a "once in a lifetime opportunity". Sophie, ex pupil of Sedgefield Community College and currently studying for a B.A. in Illustration at Sheffield Hallam University, will set out on an expedition to climb Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania to raise money to help Children throughout Africa, Asia, Latin America and the UK.

The challenge to climb Kilimanjaro is one of a number of fund raising activities promoted by the Charity 'Childreach'. The charity seeks to empower children by working to improve health care in their communities and schools. And it seeks to strengthen children's rights by working to counter the effects of child trafficking, sexual abuse, gender discrimination etc.

Sophie first came into contact with Childreach through her student union which has a partnership with the charity. Having quickly decided to become involved in the Climb Kilimanjaro project she and her fellow students have organised fund raising events in Sheffield. Closer to home, Sophie confesses that she is known to many in Sedgefield as 'The Chip Shop Girl' having worked at Sedgefield Fisheries for about 18 months before she left for university; she still does the occasional shift when released from her term-time university commitments. Some of you may have seen her collecting tin on the fish shop counter just as you enter – all donations gratefully received! She also acknowledges that many will know her as the granddaughter of one of Sedgefield's best known senior citizens, Allan Smart.

If all goes to plan, Sophie will leave for Tanzania on August 29th for a sixteen day stay. The first days of the trip will be spent visiting local schools that have benefited from Childreach projects while the last few days will give Sophie the opportunity to undertake some (personally funded) independent travel. The rest of the time will be spent on or around the mountain.

So, how hard is it to climb Kilimanjaro? Whilst it does not provide the technical challenges of an Everest or Matterhorn, at 5895m it is unarguably a very big mountain. Simon Mtuy, an experienced Kilimanjaro guide is clear about the dangers, "Altitude is the key. It is a very high mountain and climbing too quickly can bring on altitude sickness." Sophie is training by walking in the Peak District.
