#### What Sparked Off The East Park Excavations?

Well, it seems that a metal detector enthusiast from Fishburn was responsible for this exciting and important archeological discovery.

Alan Luton, a former Sedgefield man, on one of his many searches with his detector unearthed, over a period of time, several Roman coins of differing dates in different locations. He mapped and reported the finds to the Durham County Archeologist, who came to see his collection and checked the site against aerial photographs. He then called in the Time Team crew and the rest "is history."

#### **New Parish Hall Development Group**

The villagers of Sedgefield were dealt a shocking blow recently with the discovery that their beloved Parish Hall, a focus for a wide variety of village activities for generations, would have to be replaced. New regulations mean that the 150 year old hall no longer meets acoustic, disabled access or health and safety requirements Hundreds of villagers turned up for a meeting called by the Town Council to begin resolving the problem.

Following the meeting the Council asked the Sedgefield Development Partnership to take over the project and has made a grant to help start the work.

The large volunteer committee formed as a result has now broken down into 3 groups, each one working to particular responsibilities, and all meeting together once a month. One group has the daunting task of finding funding. It is estimated that the final project may cost close to £1 million.

The Sedgefield Development Partnership will be applying for grant aid from big organisations like the National Lottery, but we also want people of Sedgefield to feel involved and committed to fund raising in small ways, such as buying a seat in the new building. Already the Lyrics Youth Choir has started by running a raffle, at it's recent concert, in aid of the Parish Hall fund.

#### **Community Appraisal**

The Community Appraisal has started and a contract awarded to Chris Cox & Associates to lead the work, but its success depends on us all.

The Appraisal will help shape plans & priorities for the future. It will identify the community`s needs, concerns & priorities and will be vital in helping groups justify bids for funding.

Questionnaires will be sent to every house, please help us all by completing them.

Look out for focus group sessions and have your say.

Sedgefield Development Partnership will be organising a public presentation and discussions on the findings.



#### Mordon News -

May we congratulate the Development Partnership on this, the first issue of the Newsletter and wish it great success.

Visitors to Mordon should soon see an improvement on the approach from Bradbury, as the old barns at Mordon North, which have been derelict for many years, are about to be improved. Planning permission has been granted for their conversion into two upmarket dwellings, now sold, subject to contract. A condition is that the developer must use existing structures in the modernisation, which should mean that buildings are in sympathy with their surroundings.

To the south west of the village, on an area of high land near the media review village in Mordon Carrs, a 40 metre high mast has been erected to gain information on wind velocity over a 12 month period. We await with interest the results and consequent proposals.

# Sedgefield Mediaeval Fayre

FOR a day of dancing, singing and fun and games, this year's Mediaeval Fayre is hoped to be the best yet. It will see the

return of the Knights of the Black Phoenix, there will be another tug-o-war competition, there will be dancers and singers, Punch and Judy and the chance to dress up and get in the full mediaeval spirit of the day.

On 18th of May Sedgefield Community Association are staging their thirty-second Mediaeval Fayre. The event will start at 9.45am with a parade of floats led by the May Queen and with music provided by the Cleveland Police Band. John Robinson, Secretary of the Community Association hopes that this year's event will be the most successful yet: "We hope that this will be the start of a bumper summer. Last year was the most successful and we hope that we can take it that one step further this

year."

Family entertainment at the event will include dancing by the excellent Black Sheep Morris, Durham Rams, Palatine Clog Morris and Sedgefield County Junior School.

To add the atmosphere there will be a fun fair with a selection of rides and games and there will also be a wide variety of stalls selling crafts, food and bric-a-brac, there will even be an exhibition by the South Durham Tae Kwon-do Group.

John Robinson of Sedaefield Community Association said: "The upkeep of Ceddesfeld hall takes a lot out of the budget. If we have a good event this year it could go a long way in keeping the hall and if things go really well it could help with funding the Jubilee celebrations and other events that the association would like to run this year."
