1st Farmers' Market in Sedgefield to Coincide with Mediaeval Fayre

While you stroll round the village on May 17th, take a closer look at the patch of village green usually seen as the parking area in front of the Hope Inn. There you'll find fresh local produce on sale at the first of a series of experimental Farmers' Markets – an idea that has met with great success lately in towns all over the country. On this occasion, for obvious reasons, it has only been possible to invite producers who can provide their own stalls, but later markets will be more flexible. Supported by Northumbria Larders, who help regional producers bring their goods direct to the public, the idea is that Sedgefield should benefit from the availability of excellent regional produce, without having to travel. As well as finding out if the market appeals to the people of Sedgefield, it will be important to know which day of the week works best, so the rest of the 'pilot' markets have been marked down for Thurs 10th July, Sat 20th September, Fri 17th October, plus a date in November, to be decided.

The Tug of War Challenge

Mediaeval Fayre Chair, Wendy Gill has issued a challenge to local pubs and organisations to tug for the pride of Sedgefield! In recent years, visiting teams have done very well in the Tug of War, often winning the competition and Wendy says she would love to see the day won by a local team. Northumbrian Pipers celebrate 20 years piping in Sedgefield



Thirsty work! Real Ale goes down a treat with the pipers

Many of you will have heard the Northumbrian pipes on TV, radio and recordings, and some may have seen excellent professional pipers like Katherine Tickell and Pauline Cato, live in concert. But fewer will have seen ensemble pipes played in an informal, relaxed session style.

Here in Sedgefield we have the opportunity to listen to the pipes being played by local people on our door-step, with no distance to travel.

The Northumbrian Smallpipes are a melodious, bellows blown bagpipe, rather quiet by comparison with other bagpipes and normally played indoors, and the sound of the chanter has been likened to the singing of a lark over the buzzing of bees - the drones!

It is 20 years since the Cleveland Branch of the Northumbrian Pipers' Society was formed and the pipers celebrated recently with a concert at The Studio in Hartlepool - chosen because of its recording facilities. Fans will be pleased to know that a CD release is planned for 2004.

Regular monthly meetings used to take place in the Golden Lion, but eight years ago the pipers moved to Ceddesfield Hall and have not looked back. The very good acoustics here are ideal for playing and listening to these beautiful pipes.



In the Limelight with SEDGEFIELD PLAYERS


Formed by a handful of enthusiasts in 1970, Sedgefield Players have gone from strength to strength, developing into the award-winning group they are today. Productions Director Walter Howell has selected a wide range of plays, offering a variety of challenges to members, in terms of performance and staging, from open air Shakespeare in the grounds of Ceddesfeld Hall to traditional family pantomimes. They have mastered additional talents needed for particular shows, like tap dancing for 'Stepping Out', Irish step dancing for 'Dancing at Lughnasa' and aerobics for 'Gym and Tonic'

The Annual Festival of One Act Plays has gained national recognition and the Players have won numerous awards at this Festival and others, including the Isle of Man Easter Festival, which takes place in the beautiful Douglas Gaiety Theatre. Sedgefield Players Youth Section (SPYS) has members from the age of 7 to 18, when they transfer to the adult group. Younger members are offered plentiful opportunities to develop their performance skills and to take part in productions as a youth group but also with the seniors.

SPYS also receive coaching from adult members of the group, enabling them to take drama exams set by the London Academy for Music and Dramatic Arts (LAMDA). Many SPYS have received certificates and medals and their presentation evenings are a source of pride for parents and Players alike.

As well as the week long Festival of One Act Plays in September, involving drama groups from the region, the Players also produce a pantomime at Christmas and fulllength plays in March, June and November.

Our March production usually

crosses the sea to the Isle of Man Festival. Although we set ourselves very high, professional standards, we have a lot of fun putting on our shows. The hard work and camaraderie involved is very therapeutic, on stage, back stage or front-ofhouse. We welcome new members: no

The Pub Watch Committee has taken the decision to ban a female person of the village from all their premises for a period of 12 months, after an incident in one of the licensed premises. Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch

At the April meeting, Matters Arising were limited to *Consumption of alcohol in public places.* A letter of strong support for the local Police initiative has been sent. Hopefully a bye-law will be introduced soon.

Control of Fireworks. Letters of support with signatures for their petition sent to Institute of the Blind. Commitment to further support this important issue.

Difficulty with approvals to post notices at the new Winterton site finally resolved by Sarah Norman.

PC Keith Todd presented a table of reported crime for last two months - Burglary 4, Property Damage 5, Theft related 8, Vehicle related 7. He gave further details & answered questions.

CPO Neal Langthorne gave an end of year précis of Burglary in the Borough. Much success in reduction and detection in other wards of the Borough, but unfortunately lately, a rise in our village area, although still very low. He informed us of new training for Village Constables enabling improvements in communication between them and our Street Contacts. They can now put out relevant information & messages during their shift rather than waiting for trained day staff. A most welcome improvement sought for some time by our Panel.

NHW Coordinator Sarah Norman gave details of the Spring issue of Watch News, which has practical advice on crime prevention measures. Copies given to those present (numbers limited so no general issue).

The Chairman highlighted a major benefit of our scheme. Asked by a member of the public to help curb teenage vandalism he contacted Neal and Keith. Subsequent actions resulted in 2 people being arrested and bought to book. Hopefully this sends a message that bad behaviour & vandalism will not be tolerated here.

One member further urged reporting of bad behaviour and litter to the school/governors & pointed out that we now have a Warden appointed by the Borough who can issue litter fines.

Members are requested to provide the Chairman with questions/issues in writing for the Chief Constable (attending August meeting) by the next panel meeting (10th June) at the latest. *The raffle* raised £16.00

Victim Support for Sedgefield District

Many people who suffer from criminal damage feel the incident is a personal threat to them and worry that the offenders may return. Some can be quite seriously affected.

Victim Support is a registered charity, established to offer help and support to people who have become victims of crime. Working closely with local police, our trained workers offer all kinds of support.

Sometimes all that is needed is a listening ear and some practical advice and information, but we will also accompany a victim to court and liaise with the police to help access information.

Arthritis - joint repairs

Although around 200 diseases come under the general arthritis heading, osteo arthritis (OA) and rheumatoid arthritis (RA) are by far the most common, affecting more than 3.5 million people. There have been significant new medications, but improvements to established forms of treatment have been just as important recently.

Joint repair is improving. At least 80% of artificial hip joints now last 15 years or more; knee joints at least 10. You can also get elbow, ankle, wrist and finger joints replaced. A team at Leeds University is working on longer lasting knee joints for younger patients. Surgeons and bio-engineers in Stanmore are developing a shoulder joint that never wears out. In some centres patients with less advanced arthritis can even have a knee replacement using keyhole surgery, so they can leave hospital after just two or three days.

Surgery with a longer lifespan

Younger, more active people who have hip replacement, know the chances are they will need a second or third one later in life. Over time, artificial joints can loosen and become unstable and second and subsequent replacements may last only five to ten years.

Nowadays, hip resurfacing is a real alternative. Instead of replacing the whole joint, the surgeon removes the diseased cartilage and replaces it with a new lining comprising a metal head and cup-like implant. The resurfaced joint is extremely durable and if something goes wrong a repeat operation is simpler and easier than a full replacement. It is recommended for people who need a replacement but are likely to live longer than the artificial joint will last.

Road Safety Group

not waving, but drowning!

Rubbish! Do you ever feel we are drowning in the stuff? Paper, polystyrene containers, plastic bags fill every lay-by and virtually obliterate the grass on roadside verges and broken glass hidden in the grass is a danger to children and animals. Councils clean it up regularly but it flows on - a never-ending stream. Some comes from passing cars but pedestrians are hardly blameless!

Fly tipping is another cost to us all and it damages the environment. Picking up and disposing of old chairs, beds and other rubbish is time consuming and costly. The scale of the problem is huge. The Environment Agency estimates about 50,000 incidents of fly-tipping each year, at a cost of up to £150 million, all paid for by you and me. New regulations will help local authorities to find and prosecute fly-tippers, who could be subject to an unlimited fine or two years in prison. So what can we do to avoid the pain?

Well, we can dispose of our rubbish responsibly. If you're out & about, take your rubbish home or use a litter bin. For larger items, Sedgefield Borough Council (01388 816 166) has a special collection service which will take up to 6 household items per month absolutely free, including 'white goods' such as fridges and microwaves.

It's a problem we have to deal with, this 'built-in obsolescence' but at least we do have this safer, cleaner, environmentally sounder option.

JP We were watching the Family Relationship quiz on television on Saturday when the camera panned round to the section showing the Silver Wedding Couples. There in front of our very eyes were Sue and Bob Harris, as large as life! What we would all

like to know is how on earth did you get there?

Sue In February we celebrated our Silver Wedding Anniversary. We renewed our vows in church and invited 25 friends to a party at the Crosshills, which was wonderful. One of our friends had seen an article on the net - Talent TV were looking for couples who had just celebrated their Silver Wedding. So






Profile

Your Views Sought on Rural Transport Grant

The Countryside Agency is inviting local Town and Parish Councils to apply for grants to their Vital Villages scheme. There is up to £10,000 available for 'Parish transport' and this grant could fund:

- Replacing lost bus services
- New bus shelters
- Transport information
- Car sharing
- Driver training
- Cycling and walking schemes
- Travel vouchers
- Community transport
- Other small scale transport solutions

This is all in the process of being discussed by the Town Council, who are looking at the possibility of new bus shelters, perhaps providing cycle ways or a taxi voucher scheme that entitles residents to the cost of taxi travel. However, before the Council makes a decision, we would

welcome your views, as residents of Sedgefield on what you would like to see.

We have already been successful in obtaining a grant of £3000 towards transport/ Parish information and you will soon receive an information sheet.

It is worthwhile therefore to take advantage of the grants available for the town, at the same time giving assistance where needed, so please let us have your views as soon as possible.

Are you getting your drive re-surfaced?

If so and you no longer want your old paving slabs, the Town Council would be very grateful to acquire them for various works in the village. We can arrange to have them picked up.
