EMERGENCY - Fire Prevention

With the Firefighters' strike looking more certain, and the likelihood of cover from the Army being stretched, it is essential that Citizens take as many precautions as possible.

In an interview with Sedgefield's new Fire Station Commander, Paul Mathews, it was emphasised that people must take the initiative and form their own first line of defence.

Each household should formulate their own plan so that in the event of a fire, everyone, including the youngest members of the family, knows what they should do. Every situation is different, but with a few ground rules most situations can be handled. Any plan should cover the basics; here are a few tips from Paul

- Ensure that no electrical socket is overloaded
- Remove all plugs from sockets EVERY night, where possible
- Be extra vigilant when using chip pans. Ideally a deep fat fryer is the best, as they have safety devices inbuilt
- Keep smoking and fire lighting materials out of the reach of children
- Take care not to fall asleep when smoking
- Keep all internal doors closed (to act as fire doors)
- Formulate an escape plan

Escape Plan

- Ensure that all members of the family know that in the event of a fire, they should evacuate the building, then arrange for the Emergency Services to be contacted.
- The eldest member present should be made responsible for identifying that all members are accounted for, including any pets.
- Be sure to emphasise that under no circumstance should ANYONE re-enter the building!
- In the event that people may be trapped, they should crawl along the floor (smoke rises and any oxygen will remain at floor level). Should anyone be trapped in a room, they should close the door and push blankets or any other handy material around it to seal the gaps; open a window wide and lean out to breathe as much fresh air as possible and shout as loudly as possible to attract the attention of the Emergency Service.

If you practice the above & ensure that your whole household does the same, you should be all right.

Remember, there are a lot of heroes - but most of them are dead!! Think calmly and stay alive.



The Changing Hospital Scene Father John Caden's view

In 1966 when I came to Sedgefield as Parish Priest and full-time Hospitals Chaplain, there were 2000 patients in Winterton Psychiatric Hospital and 300 in Sedgefield General. In those days the main 'industry' in Sedgefield was hospitals - remember, in 1966 the population of the village was only 1000!

Then in the early 1970s the Northern Regional Health Authority unveiled plans to close Sedgefield General Hospital, to clear the site and re-locate all acute facilities in the new, purpose-built North Tees Hospital in Stockton. In the ensuing consultations, I joined with an old friend, Councillor Micky Terrans, to form a local Action Plan Committee, supported by councillors Terry Ward and John Burton, to put strong pressure on the Health Authority to avoid closure.

Our plan was to retain and re-vamp most of the buildings on the old site and provide a Community Hospital. This was a new and very popular concept at the time, and with invaluable support from Consultant Geriatrician Fred Gibbons, Sedgefield GPs Keith Beveridge and Elisabeth Sutherland, and Consultant Radiologist Dr. Manners, the successful Sedgefield Community Hospital was born. It contained x-ray and physiotherapy facilities, Day Hospital and Occupational Therapy, as well as GP beds and space for outpatient clinics. For the next 25 years we enjoyed this boon to the local community.

But by then the fabric of the old buildings was crumbling rapidly. Through the 1990's Dr. Peter Jones and his colleagues, along with Sedgefield Town Council, had kept up their pleas to replace the ageing Community Hospital with a super-duper new version.

The NHS Trusts in Hartlepool, Stockton, Darlington and Bishop Auckland were already engaged in fierce infighting about their future status.

However, the concept of Community Hospitals was already a proven success in the health service and an 8 million replacement in the Prime Minister's own constituency was a very realistic dream. With the help of the PFI (Private Finance Initiative), the money was immediately available and the hospital planned and completed within 12 months.

The new hospital has surpassed our wildest dreams! Barbara Fletcher, our very experienced x-ray Manager from Sedgefield General days, now boasts her own ultrasound facility in a brand-new Imaging Department. The excellent new Physiotherapy Department, the two Day Hospitals and Cath Baker's Occupational Therapy Department are an added The vastly experienced psychiatric team from the Josephine Rutter Department continue their excellent assessment of the elderly mentally infirm, under the auspices of the Durham and Darlington Priority Services Trust; and our District Nurses have found a new home there too. We wish Kath Vasey and her team a very successful

No Pain No Gain!

Hardwick Park Faces Drastic Surgery

Last month we reported on the progress of the restoration plans and though there are still hurdles to be negotiated, the work relating to trees could begin as early as December. But be warned! The process will not be pretty. Expect scenes of utter devastation in some parts of the park. Views will change alarmingly. Access to some paths will be restricted temporarily as trees are felled and removed. But it is all for a very good reason. What will emerge, as the grass begins to grow and new trees and colourful shrubs are planted in their originally intended positions, will be a park to delight the eye. The area open to the public will increase from 50 to over 200 acres.

18th century parklands were often conceived as a complicated series of inter-related vistas, with trees usually the dominant feature. Hardwick is no exception, but over the years many other trees have sprung up, either through natural regeneration or through commercial and amenity planting, mostly ignoring the original design concept and blocking vistas. The first stage will be to try to open up the original views and to clear some of the fen carr in preparation for the restoration of the Main Lake. Some areas of conifer will be felled and replaced by hardwoods, gradually restoring the woodlands to their former character.

Clearing the fen carr is undoubtedly controversial and some compromise has been necessary. The heritage interest requires the lake to be restored to its pure 18th century state - meadowland meeting open water along a clean edge, unfettered by rushes, shrubs or trees. Whereas the nature conservation lobby seeks protection of all the habitats which have developed since the lake was drained. It is impossible to fully satisfy either camp, but the ecological value of the fen has been recognised and agreement seems to have been reached to allow parts of the fen carr to fringe the lake.

Our forebears experienced similar pain as landscapes were altered in the search for new ideas. Lancelot 'Capability' Brown regularly destroyed the more intricate work of earlier designers, some as renowned as Sir John Vanbrugh, to make way for his own creations of sweeping landform, wide waters, and high woods. But today the best known of these parklands are highly cherished and there is just a hint that Brown's hand may have played a part in the design of our park, a possibility being researched by the Friends of Hardwick. Is it wishful thinking, or does the 'rumour' have substance?

These proposals don't pursue a new idea, rather a return to the 'golden age' of landscape. It is hoped that people who know and love the park 'just as it is' will have the foresight to appreciate that what will emerge will be far, far better. Think of it as a heart patient in need of a triple bypass operation - effectively the state of Hardwick today. It may be quite a while 'in theatre', but this patient is confidently expected to survive and to go on rejuvenated for another 250 years at least!
