New Life for High Street Properties

You can't have failed to notice the substantial work currently under way on the High Street, so what is going on? Well, about 2 years ago the buildings were sold to Phil Smith, who you may know from his work at 'Number Four', his wife Linda's successful business. His idea was straight-forward; to repair and refurbish them, consolidate retail areas and re-introduce residences to the upper floors. Plans were drawn up for nos. 8 and 9, to repair and extend the shop which was to be vacated by the Secret Garden. But having started work at no. 9, it soon became clear that parts of the building were structurally unsound. Renovation had turned to controlled demolition!

Meanwhile at no. 10, Booze Busters, a national company with hundreds of branches, went into liquidation. Phil's focus naturally moved to cleaning out that shop, expecting to re-let it. But nothing is ever straightforward with old property and yes, you guessed it, he found that it also was unsafe. Indeed, so bad was its condition that total collapse was distinctly possible. Remedial work had to start immediately. Not only were horrors such as walls without foundations discovered (did **you** spending time in there choosing a bottle?) but also some fascinating architectural features, and through them some of the building's possible 400 year history. was revealed.

At least things have now progressed on no. 10 and it is well on the way to being completely renewed. Structurally sound again, you can expect it to be leased to a new retailer soon. The first step in bringing life back to this part of the High Street will have been taken.

After 21 months, detailed plans for no. 8 are still



bogged down, and Phil hopes that work can now progress from no. 10, through the rear of no. 9 and end in no. 8 some time next year.

In the end there will be three shops, Reids Rains remaining as tenants of one, and four new dwellings above, with access to secluded gardens at the rear. This part of the High Street will be vibrant again and living space brought back to the town centre.

The whole development is expected to employ up to 10 people, as well as the three new jobs created in the reconstruction, and the all local team of specialist craftsmen who have

carried out the work.

So what kind of shops will they be? For the answer to that, we will all have to be patient a bit longer, but watch these pages to be first to find out!

Extract from 'Diary from Iraq'

From the report of Major Richard Taylor, The Life Guards, "D" Squadron, Household Cavalry regiment, in the Garden of Eden.

The Squadron had crossed into Iraq and completed a relief in place of 5th US Marines in the Ramalah oilfields. They were waiting in the dark to push north over the Al Hammar canal and break out of a bridgehead created by 3rd para. The plan was to scout northeast where the Iraqi 6 Armoured Division least expected us.

As 1st light appeared on 27th March, 2 troop led over the Al Hammar canal, which is over a kilometre wide. Pushing ahead of 3rd para we passed a number of abandoned Iraqi artillery and tank positions and cleared 17kms ahead to a holding area on the edge of a large irrigation ditch where we spent a surreal day.

At 5am on 28th March we advanced north, led by 3 troop. Later that afternoon, 2 troop was attacked out of the blue by 2 A-10 (American) aircraft. During the first aircraft run 4 of our men were injured. A smoke-screen was raised and the planes flew off.

On 1st April one of our AFV's (Armoured Fighting Vehicles) rolled over whilst crossing a 5-foot deep irrigation ditch. The commander and gunner were both trapped in the turret, which was sitting on the ditch bottom. After winching the vehicle over, both men were rescued. Both men were given CPR, but the gunner failed to respond and was pronounced dead when landed by helicopter at hospital. Despite two tragic accidents and intense artillery fire, the Squadron has destroyed a significant proportion of the 111 Corps Artillery and 6 Armoured Division tanks in the last seven days.

litter problem. The Council will obtain extra litterbins for the centre of the town and hope to encourage young people to use them by introducing a 'voucher' scheme in partnership with the Community College.

Also, the local Junior and Infant Schools have been asked to take part in a Litter Poster Competition. The winning entries will be displayed throughout Sedgefield and £10 Gift Vouchers will be presented to winners by the Mayor, Cllr. Linda Maddison.

It is hoped that local food outlets will enter into the spirit of the scheme by either sponsoring or indeed purchasing extra litterbins for their locality.

The idea is that by working together, the amount of litter can be reduced significantly without having to resort to the services of the Borough Council Litter Enforcement Officer who can issue on the spot fines.

Cooks' Corner *The 1st in a series of recipes from the Farmers' Market - this month, **Burtree House Farm**. The cooking instructions may seem unusual, but this is because their birds are hung for 5-10 days, making the cooking time shorter and the meat tastier.*

Perfect Roast Chicken Dinner

Chicken - 2 kg or about 4 lbs, free range, naturally!

Salt & Pepper; 1 kg potatoes; Vegetables of choice.

Remove giblets and either cook them in a pan of water with a little salt & pepper to make fantastic stock for your gravy, or put them in the roasting pan along with the chicken.

Season the chicken in the cavity and place breast down in the roasting tin and season again, along the back.

Put peeled potatoes around the chicken to roast.

Place in oven at 180°C or equivalent. Don't cover the chicken with bacon or foil, as this steams rather than roasts it and prevents the skin from crisping.

After an hour, turn the chicken on to its back for another 15 mins. to allow breast skin to crisp. Your chicken is cooked when the juices run clear on piercing the inside of the thigh with a skewer.

Once cooked, take out of oven, allow to stand for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, cook the veg and make gravy with giblet stock and the lovely juices from the roasting tin.

Community Safety *with contributions from Neighbourhood Watch, Sedgefield Police, the Road Safety Group, Primary Care Trust*

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch Annual Report, year ending September 2003, presented by Panel Chairman Mr. Ken Saiger

EXECUTIVE: Continues to meet bi-monthly between Panel meetings.

Unfortunately we are still struggling with a regular, no cost and private venue. The Police Station, our favoured location has been unavailable for most of this year, due to operational constraints. We hope that this will become available early in 2004. At present we continue to hold meetings in a member's home.

CONSTITUTION: There are no proposals to amend the constitution this year.

COMMUNICATION: We continue to believe that the monthly articles (including our full minutes bi-monthly) in the Sedgefield News are the best means possible for us to communicate with the residents of Sedgefield. Our Panel has established input to and communication with the following bodies and organisations:

Sedgefield Road Safety Committee; the Primary Care Trust; Carelink; Cavos; Town, Borough and County Councils; other Neighbourhood Watch groups throughout the country, sharing ideas and initiatives.

MEMBERSHIP: At 12th August 2003 membership stands at 260. There has been successful recruitment at the Winterton development, though we have not yet established a volunteer Area Co-ordinator from these members.

FLASK in the FRIDGE: Now firmly established in the village, this project has been handed over to Age Concern for ongoing support and continuity. Age Concern has overseen the roll-out of the scheme since our initiation in Sedgefield, from the Scottish borders down to the Yorkshire boundary.

FUNDING: An ongoing issue that this year has resulted in the (Panel approved) decision that the working members of the Panel are no longer able to continue with direct fund raising to support the existence of and activities undertaken by our Panel. In the absence of "new blood" able and willing to raise funds, the Panel will need to seek funding from other bodies or cease to exist when current funds run out. Reserves have increased this year primarily as a result of the most successful (one off) Village Raffle.

GOOD CITIZENSHIP & ALAN SOWERBY MEMORIAL AWARD: I am proud to report that these awards continue, issued to a most deserving youngster at each of the Junior schools in the village.

AUDIO TAPES FOR THE SIGHT IMPAIRED: We produce and distribute 15 copies of the Sedgefield News on cassette each month. The tapes have also included potentially beneficial details such as electoral matters, gas and other safety information. Tapes from other sources including retailers (Marks & Spencer, CO-OP etc), Durham County Council have been included and distributed to residents, the Library and Willowdene. I am pleased to say this is a most appreciated service, and amply serves to demonstrate the needs of some of our community.

OTHER ACTIVITIES: We have now fitted more than 400 door bars (at cost), and continue with marking property, testing microwaves for leakage & providing basic security information and smoke detector fitting.

We held a Security & Welfare Exhibition and a Drugs Awareness Evening this year. Both were extremely informative, but were very poorly attended. Finally on behalf of the Panel I wish to thank Sedgefield Town Council for their continued assistance and support; Sedgefield Borough Council for their cooperation and support; Carelink for their support; Community Force (notably Tim) for most invaluable assistance and support; Crime Prevention Officers Neil & Peter, Local Police Officers (notably Keith), and Sarah our Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator all of whom have given endless support and assistance to our Panel and to our village. I also must thank the many local businesses for their "regular" support and all those that supported our Raffle. *Thank you all.*

Local people help compile new Mental Health Directory

On October 10th, World Mental Health Day, local carers and users of mental health services helped Sedgefield PCT launch a comprehensive guide for people living and working in Sedgefield Borough on how to access mental health services.

It provides information on services for people needing advocacy; support for carers; community services; specialist services such as hospitals and community mental health teams; local services such as GP practices, health centres, pharmacists and the voluntary sector. The guide also includes local maps to help people find out where services are situated.

Charles McCaughey, Director of Primary Care and former Mental Health Project Manager for Sedgefield PCT, said: "The Mental Health Directory will give local people a simple and clear guide to accessing help about mental health - not just medical help, but also local community support such as education and training, advice on housing, substance misuse and the new Patient Advice and Liaison Service.

Peter Corey, a user of mental health services from Sedgefield said: "I have been very much involved in the production of this directory, from discussions about services to recommendations about layout and language. World Mental Health Day is about challenging stigma and discrimination, putting users and carers at the centre. I have really appreciated the opportunity to attend training and education courses. They have helped me to become more confident and independent and because of this I am now actively involved in training courses for other users of mental health services."

The morning ended with Martin Roberts of English Heritage highlighting architect John Paine's varied collection of buildings in the park and the afternoon was taken up by a detailed visit, following the route of the old Circuit Walk which will be opened up to visitors during the first phase of work.

Temporary speed limit

Since the £4m Heritage Lottery Grant was confirmed, rapid progress has been made in Hardwick Park and the earth-moving next to the southern entrance is the first sign of progress.

Here, a large area of ground is being levelled for the new car park. Drainage will be installed and a landscaping mound added.

During the work a 40 mph speed restriction will be placed on the A177 from the Racecourse roundabout 100 metres past the park entrance.

Tree removal is taking place in the Fen Carr, opening up the full area of the Lake and the Boardwalk been closed, whilst being cut to allow access for the machinery. Conifers and some beech trees are being removed from in front of the Gothic Ruin causing a temporary diversion of the path to behind the toilet block.

As it gets a bit muddy underfoot over the fields, don't forget that you can use the Village bus to get you to the park for your daily exercise.

There's a timetable right there, as you can see, but it is also available in booklet form from the usual outlets, including the Library and the Advice & Information Centre.

New play area takes shape

Those of you who are regular visitors to the Park will have seen the slow metamorphosis of the area next to the toilet block into a children's play area. Provided thanks to a generous grant from the National Grid, it includes two sets of swings, one for toddlers, the other for older children. There is also a slide with a climbing net, some very tempting bars at different heights and finally, a little train.

All the equipment is surrounded by a deep, wood-chip surface for safety, and tables and seats are provided for waiting grown-ups. Progress was slow but it is now ready for use at Halloween and for many years to come.



Lifelong Learning

In case you're getting bored with the same old format, this month's article is a bit different. I thought instead I'd pass on my recent and ongoing experience of learning. It's not about a wonderful College course, or some motivational seminar nor even a talk on a brand new product guaranteed to change my life for the better.



This story is about Meg, who has changed my outlook on the things happening around me.

Last month, my wife and I took a dog on trial from the NCDL complex at Sadberge. Meg is a cross Labrador bitch, about 10 months old, who had been

mistreated and abandoned by her owners. She was probably a cute Christmas present now grown too big. When we first saw her at the back of the kennel, looking very sad, it was love at first sight. After being vetted as suitable owners, we were allowed to take her home. This was when our learning started. We suddenly realised that we had a dog with a few problems. She had to learn how to socialise with people and with other dogs, and the saddest part was, she had to learn how to play. We also had to learn how to be responsible owners and to recognise the signals she was giving us. Our lives had to be adapted to take in her needs. Out walking Meg for the first time, we realised firstly that it was more a case of Meg taking us for a walk than us taking her! But the bigger shock was to realise the potential hazards we were facing. On her first walk she managed to find some discarded chip papers. Eating what she thought was food, she got a chip fork which got stuck in her throat. We managed to force open her mouth and remove it, but she was very sore. Some care we were providing to a dog who had already suffered in her early life.

But it made me realise that there were many more potential hazards in Sedgefield for Meg. We encountered danger walking at night to Bells for milk. When we got home I noticed a red mark on the floor where Meg was sitting licking herself. I thought nothing of it at first, until more marks appeared. Then I realised that Meg's paw was cut by a piece of glass. On retracing my steps in daylight, I noticed all the tiny pieces of glass on the footpaths. They may be no bother to you and me, wearing shoes with hard soles, but it was a problem to Meg. I felt that she had put her trust in me and I had let her down.

We have found that owning a dog is more than just having a companion. It's about taking responsibility and being considerate to others, clearing up the mess she deposits, to prevent other dogs and children being affected through diseases; making sure she is well trained when walking to prevent road and other accidents.

We have learnt during our walks where the danger areas are and it has made us more aware of our surroundings.

Perhaps we don't think of others as much as we should; about the consequences of our actions on other people and animals.

As responsible citizens, maybe we should think about why some places are in this dangerous condition and make sure we don't add to the hazards faced by both people and their pets.

Road Safety - 2 responses

Sadly, on October 1st, as a result of the accident referred to last month, the male rider of the motorbike involved in the accident with the minibus, died. It has made me put pen to paper and suggest two options that will hopefully make the junction of Stockton Road & the A689 safer than it is at present. They are as follows. Option 1 involves installing traffic lights with speed cameras where the A689 meets Stockton Road.

Option 2 would involve installing a roundabout where the A689 meets Stockton Road. I am convinced either option would make the junction safer and the two young people involved in the recent tragic accident will not have died in vain.

It was sad to read of the first death on the newly rebuilt sections of the A689. As always on these occasions there is a tendency to seek someone to blame but usually the truth is a combination of factors. The difficulty is trying to identify the contributory elements before accidents occur. We are so often told that speed is the main cause of many accidents and yet ironically we all want to get around faster.

In Bradbury, the residents have been campaigning, to a greater or lesser degree, for over 20 years to have some form of speed reduction through our small village. We have been told that the village isn't long enough for a

speed limit of any sort and we have requested signs warning of the use of farm machinery all to no avail.

A couple of years ago we finally saw the light at the end of the tunnel; Durham County Council decided that our little community was to be granted a "village gateway"! This consists of a few yellow lines painted across the road and a short section of timber fencing at each side of the carriageway, at right angles to kerb line. One mustn't forget the half dozen or so red reflectors. We were thrilled as well to receive a new blue village name sign.

At first the gateway seemed to be effective, even though within a week of painting the lines on the road it was resurfaced and we had to fight to convince the Highways Department that yellow lines had ever existed. The problem now is that the unpainted timber fence has become dirty; the green tinted preservative has turned the fencing the same colour as the background of grass, bushes and trees when seen from a moving vehicle.

The Parish Clerk wrote to the Highways department expressing our concerns and offering to paint the fence white, on the front side only, at no expense to the County Council. Sadly the mandarins categorically refused for the most spurious and in truth downright silly technical reason that, in their opinion, the paint wouldn't stick to the timber. A recent letter to County Hall resulted in an acknowledgement and nothing more. The purpose of this letter is, first to ask your readers to think

about the residents of small villages when tearing about in cars and second, to advise anyone trying to get serious responses from DCC's Highway Department to be prepared for a generation of correspondence and few if any intelligent replies.
