

#### **Caravan Park**

As you may already know the application to site 378 caravans and lodges on historic parkland adjacent to Hardwick Country Park was turned down on appeal. The applicant is now re-applying for permission on the same site, with the omission of the previously proposed lodges. This proposal is for 330 caravans.

There has been a very short preapplication, unmanned consultation in the library for two days, 17th and 18th October and by now the full application will probably have been submitted.

Sedgefield Residents' Forum hopes to seek the views of the community shortly about this proposal, in the meantime if you are interested in this application or would like to discuss it further please contact them via the Town Council office.

#### **33rd Sedgefield Drama Festival report**

The highly successful Festival of One Act Plays was held in September, with packed houses all week and a very high standard throughout the week. Overall winners were Saltburn 53 Drama Group with "Only a Matter of Time" and the Audience Award went to "Seven Stages of an Affair" by Cliffe Theatre, whose Barrie Robinson won Best Actor. Sedgefield Players won the Mayor's Runner-up Award for their production of "High Brave Boy", in which Sarah Legender won Best Actress and Sarah McGuinness, the individual youth award. Both gave outstanding performances under the talented direction of Thomas Guest. The Peter Young Quaich for Youth was awarded to the SPYS for "The Wind in the Willows", which also won the Costume Award and the Cameo Award for Janine Yaxley as the Washerwoman. Sedgefield Players also won the John Walker Memorial Award for Technical Presentation for the very effective music in "Melody".

Statement Drama Company of Scarborough won Most Effective Set for "Do Us Part" and the Best 30 Seconds Award for the opening scene of "It's About Forgiveness", in which Sue Wilding as Myrna won the Adjudicator's Award. Best Supporting Actor and Actress were Doug Clayton of Richmond ADS in "The Last Bread Pudding" and Lin Blyth of Masham Players in "Costa del Packet". Rowan Pierce won the Ray Tate Award for Endeavour for her direction of Saltburn 53 Youth Group in "The Cagebirds"

Adjudicator Colin Dolley, on his sixth visit to Sedgefield, was very impressed by the standard of the Festival, saying any one of the top five productions would have won many another festival. He also expressed admiration for the wonderful refurbishment of the Parish Hall, which had been under threat of closure on his last visit in 2005. It has been a few years since Andy Jackson's Cobweb Orchestra last came to Sedgefield to treat us to a programme of classical music but they came back in late September with their Baroque group, led by Toby Lipman. They spent much of the day rehearsing a programme of 5 delightful pieces, then kept the audience in St. Edmund's Parish Church enthralled with splendid music and fascinating insights into the history of each piece.

The programme consisted of 3 Vivaldi Concerti, including the famous Echo Concerto in A major, Telemann's Don Quixote Overture (Toby humorously explaining the significance of each piece in the Suite) and J.S. Bach's Concerto for 2 violins, which demonstrated both players' nimble-fingered technique to great effect. 14 year old Tim Jasper was on home soil for once, playing 'cello with the Cobwebs, and a guest appearance by another 14 year old Sedgefield boy, Jonathan Clegg, on St. Edmund's Church organ, showed his burgeoning talent with his arrangement of Pachelbel's Canon plus 2 of his own stirring compositions.

Münsterland fare of pork and sauerkraut round an open fire in a traditional barn with no chimney – very atmospheric! We also had a wonderful boat trip along the Rhine from Wesel to Duisburg including a panoramic tour of Duisburg Harbour. The sun shone all the time! A more unusual but very interesting highlight was a visit to the construction site of the new bridge over the Rhine at Wesel, followed by a visit to the Museum of Prussia. # Community SAFETY



#### Winter Nights - Security Concerns

With the dark nights comes the burglar & sneak thief's greatest opportunity. Take the time and trouble to help yourself minimise the risk of providing them with an "early Xmas Bonus".

- Don't leave your house unlit after dark use light timers, and draw your curtains.
- Don't leave valuable or desirable items on show.
- Lock your doors even when you are at home.
- Don't leave your keys (and this includes your car keys) where a thief can see them or where they can be hooked and retrieved via the letterbox.
- Tell a "trusted" neighbour of any extended periods of absence and ask for their help to push all letters and papers fully through the letterbox (& why not complain to the culprits who leave stuff sticking out in the first place?). Better still if you have a trusted neighbour ask them to draw curtains, move mail and newspapers out of sight and generally keep an eye on your home whilst you are away.
- Report any suspicious persons or out of place vehicles to the Police on 0345 60 60 365. The Police want us to do this, as it is a major source of crime detection & prevention.

**Door Bars** are a simple and effective deterrent to the sneak thief or unwelcome visitor; these are available from our local Community Warden Tim Spearey, who will also fit same if required (contact Tim - see phone details below or you can contact N/Hood Watch C/man Ken Saiger on 621896).

Visible burglar alarms make burglars think twice and usually they go elsewhere, similarly good exterior lighting usually deters thieves; for advice on these items and other security aspects contact Neil Langthorne our local Crime Prevention Officer on 01325 742714.

To deter unwanted people from calling why don't you make your home visibly a **NO COLD CALLING HOME?** Encourage the unwanted door knockers to pass your house by. Attach a Neighbourhood Watch "This is a No Cold Calling Home" window or door sticker to a prominent position at the front of your property. Stickers are now available free of charge (1 per household) from the Town Council Offices in the village.

#### Cold calling - advice on your rights.

A company called Medicare Health System Ltd is telephoning elderly people in County Durham offering to sell various pieces of equipment, such as massage chairs, at very high prices. They call and then send a representative to the person's home. They nearly sold a chair costing £1400 which can be obtained for approx £200 elsewhere. If it had not been for the intervention of this person's daughter this sale would have proceeded. We have also received reports of a white van operating in other parts of the county, cold calling to offer roofing repairs and possibly charging an excessive amount for the work undertaken.

It is now a legal requirement that consumers are given a written notice of cancellation rights, whether or not the visit is invited or a cold call at home. For further guidance and clarification on The Cancellation of Contracts made in a Consumer's Home or Place of Work etc Regulations 2008 (Doorstep Selling Rights) please contact Trading Standards on 0191 383 3589

#### **PC Todd reports**

Recently crime has moved from stealing from garages to an easier target – "Works' Vans". By their very nature, they suggest that inside, thieves would find a whole host of interesting and expensive tools and equipment (not forgetting the boring claw hammer and spanner set)

Works' vans have been targeted in Eden Drive, The Meadows and Hadleigh Close. Fishburn and the Trimdons have had similar problems. Please have a think as to making your van more secure. A burglary was committed recently in Cragside which, in police terms, is known as a 2 in 1 burglary. This crime requires that a house is broken into and the car keys stolen. The burglars then leave by the front door, locking the door behind them, so that if you disturb them it gives them a chance of getting away. Where do you keep your car keys? Other crimes reported to the police include damage to the church wall; windows broken in Sedgefield primary school; number plates stolen in West Park Lane and Millclose Walk.

# Jottings

#### Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum October meeting

As usual the meeting covered many issues, for example, footpath repairs (or lack of), village policing, information from the GP Patient Panel representative including information on the new LINK initiative (Link is about patient involvement in health care), transfer of SBC housing stock and the implication of the land involved, the situation with the new build at the Community College and what community facilities will be included - that's just highlighting a few of the issues.

Great concern was expressed that there seems to be a continuation of the stray dog attacking family pets, the police are still seeking to take action, but there continues to be great distress caused to those who are victims of this ongoing irresponsible dog ownership.

Local Government Reorganisation still is very unclear and we seem to be having the Area Action Partnership (AAP) areas forced on us without due consultation – there are rumours that we will be in Sedgefield and the Eastern Corridor (AAP) which may include areas as distant as Wingate, Thornley, Wheatley Hill – we await further clear information. Also, you may have seen in the press that, between 21 October 08 and 12 January 2009, the Electoral Commission's Boundary Committee wants to hear local views on how local areas should be represented before it consults on its draft recommendations between 7 April and 1 June 2009. It would seem that they want to draw some different boundary lines - all very confusing. We don't know who or how that consultation will be done but the Electoral Commission website is www.electoralcommission.org.uk/boundary-reviews We have only managed a couple of Forum Agendas without the proposed Holiday Park taking considerable priority; unfortunately it is back on the Agenda already. The developer is submitting another application, still for 330 caravans (only removing the 48 lodges) so really the situation doesn't change; it will still be 330 residences impacting on our community resources. So we believe the community's objection to the development has not changed and we anticipate community action as before. Anyone wishing

#### **Hardwick Park restoration update**

As anyone visiting Hardwick Park will have seen, restoration to its former 18<sup>th</sup> century glory is nearing completion. Current works involve the construction of the cascade on the dam – for which the lake's water level has been dropped; earthworks to create the final form of the temple Field and, perhaps most obvious, the works around the visitor centre to create the final landform and paths.

This phase of the work is expected to be completed by the end of the year. The 'official' opening of the site is expected to take place in April. New Year will see the visitor centre being fitted out and the final works undertaken around the Park such as the installation of litter and dog waste bins.

Unfortunately, due to many factors, the standard of care in the Park has been much less than we would hope to achieve and the Countryside Rangers will be working over the winter to bring the site up to a standard that will be more easy to maintain. A considerable amount of work has been undertaken by volunteers and we would very much like to hear from anyone interested in offering their services in helping run the Park. A range of tasks will be available so, if you are interested, please either have a word with the Site Ranger, Michael Munro, or contact us at the address below.

Although the development of the Park has been funded from many different sources, and most notably the Heritage Lottery Fund, much of the costs of running the Park still need to be found. One aspect that will be essential to generate income will be to charge for parking. Early in the New Year the new car park will be opened and the current car parks and vehicle access closed. A charge of £1.00 per car will be made until the formal opening of the visitor centre. A 'season' ticket will be available for regular visitors but the cost is yet to be determined. A revised scale of charges will operate following the Park's formal opening.

We do hope you will enjoy the restored Park and the new range of facilities that are being provided. More information about the opening will be given in the next edition of Sedgefield News.
