# Splendid new artwork on view at Sedgefield Surgery

The large painted mural hanging in the foyer of the surgery is the result of collaboration between staff and students of Sedgefield Community College and highly respected local artist, Brian Sutherland. The students were able to develop many skills and importantly, to experience working with a professional artist. # Netpark gains world leading research centre

A pioneering £10m development aims to make the North East of England a centre of excellence in the plastics industry, with a £10m Plastic Electronics Technology Centre (PETeC) planned for the NetPark technology complex. Featuring specialist laboratories, it will be available to companies seeking to develop new products and services and will support projects emerging from Newcastle's Science City and the region's universities.

The research and development facility will house scientists developing printing technologies, including techniques that enable electronics to be printed directly onto paper-thin plastic sheets. The centre (see right) will be managed by Cenamps, a national centre for emerging small-scale technologies.

One NorthEast and the County Durham Economic Partnership are investing a combined £6.2m, with the European Regional Development Fund making up the

rest.

David Allison, One NorthEast director of business and industry, says this project will ensure that our region is a world leader in the research and development in the field of plastic electronics.

# Ageing well with Tai Chi!



The Age Concern Tai Chi sessions that run at the Parish Hall have now restarted and Peter Leggett, pictured leading the group, is keen to invite new people to this very inclusive course of exercise.

Peter describes Tai Chi as "not brutal or aggressive; relying on internal force, not physical size or strength". It is certainly not limited by age, sex or size and is practiced by many people throughout their lives. People in their eighties who practice regularly are to be found in much better health than those who don't. They generally appear much younger than their contemporaries too. One Chinese master said "Life begins at seventy ..." - food for thought indeed.

If you're 50+ you're very welcome to the sessions, which run from 10.30 - 11.30am on Tuesdays, apart from the second Tuesday in the month. The suggested donation for the session is £2, which goes directly towards contributing to paying for both the tutor and the hall.

# If you prefer something a little more conventional, there's an exercise class for those over 50 who have had little or no exercise over the last few years.

Many people are worried about starting any type of exercise after a long time away from it, but tutor Sue has a great track record of getting people in this situation back on the road to enjoying exercise at a suitable level. # **Hardwick Park revisited**

If you had gone to Hardwick Park one blustery but bright Saturday in late July you could almost have imagined that you had gone back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century. You would have been greeted by John Burdon, the master of Hardwick, and his manservant together with his gamekeeper and ladies and gentlemen from the Hall. In reality an open day was in full swing and several people connected to the Park were in appropriate costumes of the period when the Park was in its hey-day.

In a big marquee at the foot of the Gothic Ruin, the 'Friends of Hardwick' mounted an exhibition which illustrated the restoration of the important buildings in the Park as well as old documents from John Burdon's household cash books. Durham County Council Rangers had a number of attractions for children – colouring butterflies on sticks, a bran tub, to name a few. There was also an information section with leaflets etc. The star attraction of the day was guided walks round the newly restored Circuit Walk where visitors were shown the Gothic Seat, the remains of the Bath House, the Bottle Pond and façade of the Bono Retiro before being shown the interior of the Temple of Minerva with its pristine plasterwork and patterned marble floor. A good day was had by all.

# **Bogus Callers / Distraction Burglaries**

This type of crime is one where someone "cold calls" pretending to be from the Water Board or some other organisation (usually housing related) and gains entry to the property and then a second person also enters and theft occurs. Whilst it is usually money that is stolen much worse for the victim is their security and personal confidence is not only stolen it is often destroyed completely.

Victims are generally the elderly and are certainly targeted by these criminals who can be wearing suits equipped with clipboards, forms and even false identification and they are all plausible – but dishonest villains! There has been a marked increase in this type of crime in our Borough and it has happened in our village amongst others.

Please be on your guard and look out for your neighbours and the elderly, do not admit anyone to your home without being absolutely sure; it is easy enough if you are in doubt to tell the caller to get their organisation to telephone you but do not give them your tel. number – if the need is genuine their organisation will be able to get this and ring you. Also if you have any doubts ring the police (see below) and tell them of your worries and ask for assistance – they will respond.

Our local Police Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator actively runs a very relevant scheme (see below), for further details contact Sarah in person or Ken Saiger N/Hood Watch Chairman on 621896

## **Nominated Neighbour Scheme**

This is an initiative designed to reduce bogus callers in the area. The scheme allows anyone who feels vulnerable to nominate another neighbour to check callers to their home. Basically the resident shows the caller a card, without entering into conversation with them, which states:

I do not recognise you. Please go to number ..., who is my nominated neighbour.

They will check your identity and return with you. The nominated neighbour would then check their authenticity and return with them. There are still some Nominated Neighbour Packs left if anyone would like one, please contact Sarah Norman from Neighbourhood Watch at Spennymoor Police Station on 01325 742755. Your village N/Hood Watch believe that a very good start to reducing this type of crime is to reduce the opportunity for people to knock on our doors; and we believe we should follow the idea initiated at Shotton – No cold callers allowed in Sedgefield. # Jottings from Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum

There was no Forum meeting in August, so no formal issues to report or comment on. However, here are a couple of things for your information and consideration.

Sedgefield Borough Council (SBC) is currently seeking community views on the SBC Local Development Framework. This framework affects us all and can be accessed on www.sedgefield.gov.uk. Comments need to be with SBC by Oct 10<sup>th</sup>. The document gives several options to issues; eg. referring to housing development **"focus development in regeneration areas, reduce development in main towns and increase development in villages**". Another is **"Update and revise town centre boundaries and consider need for new boundary in Sedgefield Village**" (We haven't yet been able to find out if this means increase or decrease our town centre area). It also identifies the need for more housing in relation to the development of Netpark.

The document refers to Sedgefield Borough being in the Tees Valley City Region. Other documents don't list Sedgefield Borough as being part of the Tees Valley City Region and now reports say the Gordon Brown wants to 'water down' the City Region initiative. All very confusing and concerning – is being in the Tees Valley City Region the best option for us in Sedgefield? We need more information and consultation on this issue.

Other issues in focus are the proposed 10 additional wind turbines (Butterwick Plantation area) and the proposed new build of the Community College (what facilities would the community possibly like to be included). The next Forum meeting is at 7 pm on October 23<sup>rd</sup> in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall. Forum meetings take place on the 4<sup>th</sup> Monday of each month - information can be found on the village notice board, the Library, Town Council Offices and on the village web sites – everyone is welcome.

# **Sedgefield Veterans**

Meanwhile we will raise funds through our Sponsored Walk. # What do you do on Sundays?

Relax with a cup of coffee and the Sunday papers of course. What else? Well, not Ian Blakemore from Sedgefield. On Sunday 20th August, he was at Sherborne Castle in Dorset. Nothing too unusual in that; Sherborne Castle is a popular tourist spot with stunning grounds two castles and a lake. But by 6am Ian was in the lake - and 2.4 miles and 1hr 16 minutes later he was on his bike cycling through Dorset and Somerset. After another 6hrs and 11 minutes he was running around the grounds of the castle and the nearby roads. Finally at 5.20pm – a full 11 hours, 19 minutes and 56 seconds after starting, Ian had completed the UK Ironman Triathlon.

This was only the second time that a full Ironman has been held in the UK. Ian is in the police force in Durham and entered the Ironman with 2 colleagues from Aykley Heads. He is also a member of Sedgefield Harriers running club where he typically sets the pace for the faster runners on Wednesday evening training runs in and around Sedgefield. He has competed in a number of shorter triathlon events including, this year, the Ripon Triathlon, the Cleveland Steelman Triathlon and the Hartlepool Marina Triathlon, which he completed only a week after the Ironman. But Ironman is a different prospect altogether and is a world event with races being held regularly in such places as Australia, Austria, Lanzarote, Nice, South Africa and Florida culminating in the Ironman World Championships in Hawii. The 'Sherborne' is a qualifying event for Hawii. Triathlon has become a popular event at shorter distances with the Olympic distance (1500m swim, 40km Bike Ride and 10k run) now becoming the standard. Great Britain now boasts the Triathlon World Champion in Tim Don who won his title in Lausanne, Switzerland on 2nd September. At Sherborne there were 1500 entries in a top class international field. Leaving the water Ian was two thirds down the field – swimming being Ian's weaker of the three disciplines (he only gets to put in 3 x 1hr swim sessions per week!) but he progressed through the field on the bike and the run, being in the top third of the field for the bike and in the top 80 in the marathon with a time of 3hrs 41:26.

Ian typically trains on the bike with rides up to 80 miles and on the road running up to 20 miles. In an average week he will train for 15 hours and consume over 5000 calories per day. Before the race Ian felt he would be delighted to beat 12hrs so he was 'over the moon' with a finishing time of 11hrs and 19 minutes and 56 seconds. The winner was Frank Heldoorn of the Netherlands in a time of 8hrs 36:38. Ian focused his training on the Ironman from October of last year, picking up intensity and distance in March and this was a truly inspirational achievement. Everyone in Sedgefield must wish Ian warmest congratulations and best of luck for his future triathlon endeavours. *More details of Ian's Ironman, his training and experience is available on*

# the Bookworm

**Tales of the Country** by Brian Viner; *paperback pub. by Pocket Books at £7.99 (2005)* 

From first reading Viner's weekly dispatches from Herefordshire in the 'Independent' I was hooked, so I was very pleased indeed when his book was published. His account of moving to 'the country' with his wife and 3 children from sophisticated Crouch End, North London is a masterpiece. While I can't claim that there is a laugh on every one of the 301 pages, there are enough to make your sides ache. I couldn't put it down. Anyone who has ever moved from a city to a country area will find much here to please them! A long list of famous people have praised it, with good reason. It is without doubt full of "hilarious anecdotes and wonderful characters".

I found it all the more appealing because I know that part of Herefordshire very well. I don't know Crouch End at all. Docklow, near Leominster, is idyllic; whether the natives appreciate the publicity is perhaps another matter. The only fault I find is common nowadays - the unnecessary use of the 'F' word.

One anecdote stands out to me at least. That is the tale of the curate, the posh person from Pershore and her very angry Alsatian. Viner describes it as an Urban Myth but it seems very realistic to me. Buy or borrow this tonic of a book. You will not regret it. AS

# Cooks' Corner: Christmas Pud

**Mix together** 100g of each of the following: breadcrumbs, plain flour, shredded suet, brown sugar, currents, sultanas, chopped candied peel, grated cooking apple, grated carrot, chopped blanched or ground almonds. **Add** 250g seedless raisins, 50g glace cherries, 1 tsp mixed spice, 1 tsp cinnamon, 1 tbsp black treacle, ¼ pt Guinness, 2 eggs

**Put in greased 1lb basins**, cover well with double layer greaseproof paper. Steam 4-6 hours, ensuring they don't boil dry. If using smaller basins, reduce steaming time to 3 hours each. Remove wet covers and replace with fresh ones. Store in a cool dry place. Can be made 2 or 3 months in advance. **On Christmas day**, steam for 2 - 3 hours. Serve with brandy butter (unsalted butter blended with equal weight of icing sugar, juice & rind of an orange and brandy to taste) or rum sauce (white béchamel with rum stirred through).

# Meg Clubley: wine for your pudding

The important thing is that your pudding wine should be at least as sweet as the pudding, preferably sweeter (if less sweet the acidity comes through too much & it just tastes sour). It should also be as intense & powerful as the pudding, or it just tastes bland.

This limits the choice in the case of an intensely flavoured pudding like Christmas Pud, but my all time favourite is a gooey Oloroso, like Gonzalez Byass Matusalem, which has lots of spicy, marmalade & liquorice flavours that really complement the pud. It is quite an old-fashioned flavour admittedly.

If readers want a more modern, fruit driven alternative, I suggest an Aussie, Rutherglen Brown Muscat (fortified in the same way as Port) - again complex, powerful & rich, but with a more floral & fruit driven character. For a less-known but equally good twist on the Port tradition, a Tawny Port, in many ways more versatile & food friendly than Vintage Port, will double up well with pud & cheese.

# Part-time fire crew take honours at show

Congratulations to the crew from Sedgefield Fire Station who recently won the county extrication competition at the Great Aycliffe Show. This was a staged rescue of a casualty from a car, involving emergency medical care of the casualty as well as cutting the car open to allow safe egress for the stabilised casualty.

National judges did the marking and the Sedgefield team (all parttimers) were up against wholetimers and management teams as well as other part time stations. They also got best medic award and best tool operators! The scenario is a two car collision involving one casualty and is judged by assessors from United Kingdom Rescue Organisation. 20 minutes is allowed to safely remove the casualty from the car.

We can't show the whole sequence, but it goes like this: second car removed & chocked: casualty & medic protected with plastic cover while glass is removed: medic assesses injuries while administering oxygen & applying neck collar: front screen cut with a glass saw: rear nearside door removed to enable rapid removal of casualty if situation requires (removal of rear offside door also part of this plan): Casualty stabilised, work continues for safe removal of roof, tool ops working closely together cutting, while protecting occupants: final cut is always next to the casualty, with everyone in position to take the weight - then it's lift-off! All sharp areas are covered for everyone's protection and the spine board is brought in to assist in safe removal of casualty. (see the full sequence on www.sedgefieldweb.co.uk)

A little over a year ago I asked Sedgefield News to include an item suggesting a running club for Sedgefield. Anyone interested was asked to meet at the gates of the cricket club.
