One rainy Great North Runday morning...

From the editor, Sunday 19th September. Putting the finishing touches to Sedgefield News today, I had coverage of the GNR running in the background, hoping to spot some Sedgefield runners, like 'Sedgefield Sarah', inheritor of Dame Memory-Jogger's crown and Chris Lines, whose Sports Update came in late last night while he still had the energy to type ... "I am typing this on the eve of the 30th Great North Run. The media coverage in the lead up to the event has brought back many memories and reminded me of what a special occasion it is. $\bar{I'}$ ve been privileged to complete the run numerous times, but before I was an enthusiastic spectator at an event that has grown into an international sporting institution. Most people who have been touched by the Great North Run can recount great stories of their experiences. For my part, I remember watching in about 1982, as Kevin Keegan pushed a wheelchair competitor around the course. As he passed the spot at which I was standing with my mum, brothers and sister, he spotted that I was wearing a Nottingham Forest football shirt. Mr Keegan slowed down, veered towards me and jokingly enquired about the wisdom of my choice of attire. Then off he went again, pushing that wheelchair to South Shields. That moment, and many more, inspired me as a kid and so here I am almost 30 years later, preparing to join nearly 40,000 other runners (a few thousand of the 50,000 entrants don't make it to the start for various reasons), including a good number from Sedgefield, as we all make our way along that now very famous course measuring 13 miles and 192 yards. Next month, I hope to bring you some Sedgefield stories from this year's Great North Run, so if you have one of your own, please let me know and I'll try to include it." I was representing the Harriers for the first time and twice on the way round I heard 'Go Sedgefield' shouts from spectators, which was nice! Ours is just one of thousands of great stories of course and loads of people we know were running for equally great causes."

Ellen Guest, Sedgefield Youth Worker, also ran again, alongside Emma Johnson & her Dad, Barry. They came in at 2hrs 10 mins, personal bests for all three. Brilliant!

The results were terrific for both Sedgefield and Fishburn at the Northumbria in Bloom awards ceremony, held recently at Eaglescliffe. Members of Sedgefield in Bloom were delighted to win gold and the Federation Breweries Award for Best Small Town and Fishburn took silver in the Best Large Village category. Trophies and certificates were presented by Sir John Hall, (photo page 7) whose speech praised the commitment and efforts of everyone involved. Presenters Marian Foster, well known from local TV and radio, and Walter Dinning, an experienced professional gardener and judge, welcomed to the stage the winners of awards in over 30 categories. The judges praised the enthusiasm and community involvement evident in Sedgefield, exemplifying the ethos of Northumbria in Bloom. Sedgefield also had winners in the special awards, Hardwick Park and the Dun Cow Inn receiving silver gilt and the residents of Claremont Grove a gold award for their beautiful front gardens. Great results day at Community College

What a truly amazing set of results! Not only has the Sedgefield class of 2010 recorded the best results the college has ever produced, it has set a whole new benchmark against which subsequent year groups must target to achieve or indeed surpass.

For a number of years the percentage of Sedgefield students achieving the nationally recognised 'gold standard' measure of attainment (5+A*-C with English and Maths) had become stuck around 47%. This year however, innovative approaches adopted across the college coupled with the unwavering commitment of students and staff has resulted in the previous 'best' being smashed and a new college record being set, with 64% of students achieving the 5+A*-C (with English and Maths) standard, an increase of 15% on the previous college best.

This is not the only success in what is a consistently impressive set of results. Student performance has improved across the full ability range. Just as pleasing is the percentage of students who achieved five higher grade passes; 96% of students reached this standard against a previous college record of 83%, proving that all students, regardless of ability, can and do achieve highly at Sedgefield Community College.

As we continue to plan to move into our new building in January this provides us with the perfect platform upon which to build the sustained and continuous improvements that we strive for. Well done the class of 2010!

Community SAFETY

Dark Nights - Security Concerns

With the dark nights just round the corner, comes the Burglar & Sneak Thief's greatest opportunity. Take time and trouble to help yourself minimise the risk of providing them with an "early Xmas Bonus" Don't leave your house unlit after dark. Use light timers and draw curtains. Don't leave valuable or desirable items on show.

Lock your doors even when you are at home.

Don't leave your keys (includes your car keys) where a thief can see them or where they can be hooked and retrieved via the letterbox.

Don't leave toys/bikes around your property. It tells the thief you are not security conscious.

DO Lock your car & check it is locked when you leave it. We don't want a repeat of this year's car crime wave. Thieves re-visit easy pickings! Tell a 'trusted' neighbour of extended periods of absence and ask for their help to push letters & papers fully through the letterbox (& why not complain to the culprits who leave stuff sticking out in the first place?). Better still if you have a trusted neighbour ask them to draw curtains, put mail/newspapers out of sight & generally keep an eye on your home whilst you are away.

Report suspicious persons or out of place vehicles to Police 0345 60 60 365. Police want the public to do this, as it is a major source of crime detection, as well as crime prevention.

Door Bars are a simple and effective deterrent to the sneak thief or unwelcome visitor; they are available from Community Warden Tim Spearey who will also fit same if required (see Tim's phone details below or contact N/Hood Watch C/man Ken Saiger: 621896).

Visible burglar alarms make burglars think twice and usually they go elsewhere, similarly good exterior lighting usually deters thieves; for advice on these items and other security aspects contact Keith Lounds, our local Crime Prevention Officer on 01325 742714.

To deter unwanted people from calling as the nights draw in, why don't you make your home visibly a NO COLD CALLING HOME? Window & Door notices are still available from the Town Council Offices, free.

For the majority of "Cold Callers" the notices seem to act as a good deterrent but of course there are still several individuals who will choose to ignore them and be a nuisance to you in their own interests - not yours! From experience it seems clear that if complaints are made to companies by individual householders (ask for a response in writing) most organisations will confirm that they don't want their reps annoying the general public and consequently running the risk of damaging their reputation, and will take steps to reprimand the offender. So if you are sufficiently irritated by a rep ignoring your notice let the company know - give them a flea in their ear. If you display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and still get door knocked, options to consider:

Do not answer the door (waste their time not yours).

If you do answer the door, ask them for their name/I.D., their company telephone details, then ask why they ignored the notice & finally ask them to leave. Then take the time & trouble to report them to their organisation & seek an apology etc in writing. Pass details on to either the N/Hood Watch or our Police Liaison Officer Neil Langthorne (see below).

If any of you receive any abuse try & obtain their personal details, make a note of their description & contact the Police immediately.

If the caller is suspicious in any way, try & obtain their personal details, make a note of their description & contact the Police immediately.

Flask in the Fridge

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. If the Emergency Services are called to help you, it is vital that the information which is your information, is accurate & up to date. It is for your benefit only.

JOTTINGS from September Residents' Forum meeting

The general business issues of the Forum were put on hold this month to accommodate discussion on the proposed wind turbines for Spring Lane. Durham County Council (DCC) planning officers held an information exhibition in the Parish Hall from 3pm to 7pm before the Forum meeting to give residents opportunity to view and ask questions on the contentious issues relating to the application. Officers were kept busy throughout, in fact found it a little difficult to cope with the numbers attending at some points. By the time you read this we will all have had to send in our letters of objection or support; however we have not yet heard a single voice supporting the application. We don't yet know the date of the planning meeting where a decision on the application will be made nor do we know what recommendation (either to support or refuse) the officers will make to the planning committee. Keep a watch on the village notice board for the date of the planning meeting – remember anyone can attend. The Forum have, for some time, been trying to ascertain what has happened to circa £47000 Section 106 money held by DCC from the Cunningham Court development which is to be spent for community benefit. We have involved the Local Government Ombudsman to help with our enquiries and have now asked the Area Action Partnership (AAP) to get some answers for us through the Community Issue part of the AAP agenda. We will report back at the next Forum, meeting. Next meeting October 4th, 7pm; Fletcher Room, Parish Hall. All welcome

Notes from **Sedgefield Borough Homes** (sbh) Payment cards

Tenants renting homes and garages from sbh can now use payment cards at local Post Offices and anywhere displaying the Paypoint sign. Anyone who expresses an interest in using the new payment card will receive a free card, with a covering letter explaining where it can be used. Transaction costs will be paid by sbh. Apprenticeships

Sedgefield Borough Housing and strategic partners Mears & Bullock, have recruited 14 apprentices through the 'Great Futures' partnership. The Apprenticeships cover a range of jobs including accountancy, joinery, business administration and multi-skilling. Each Apprenticeship lasts for



approximately two years, during which time the Apprentices (pictured above) will gain work experience and complete a relevant qualification. Most of the Apprenticeships will lead to permanent employment.

Maintaining and Improving Neighbourhoods

We now provides a single point of contact for tenants and residents to deal with issues in their communities, with a named neighbourhood officer on hand to help with a whole range of issues from managing their tenancy successfully to ensuring estates are clean and tidy. Grounds maintenance services provided to sbh by Durham County Council will continue for another year up to the end of March 2012. This work has a value of over £300,000 and will ensure that estates are tidy and well cared for ,and that local jobs are protected.

Efficiency savings

We have made efficiency savings of £2.8M in our first year of business. Promises were made to tenants to achieve savings with no reduction in the quality of the services received. Most savings (£2.2M) were made against the costs of purchasing the same quality component for a lower price and in some cases purchasing better components for the same original price for the major improvements of properties. The rest of the savings have come from managing assets and resources in a more efficient and effective manner. Savings are expected to grow to around £4M for the current year.

Butterwick Moor wind turbines

Delivery update: we are advised by Eon that the final four turbines will be delivered from 11th October, the last one being erected on 25th October, weather conditions and traffic restrictions allowing.

Football

Sedgefield Youth FC

Sedgefield Youth recently took part in a pre-season tournament in Eaglescliffe. The team's first game was against Thornaby Central, which ended in a 1-1 draw, with Sedgefield's goal scored by Anthony (I'll ask for surnames to include in future reports!) from a corner. Sedgefield won their second game 3-2, against Eaglescliffe Elementis, with Daniel and Cameron on the scoresheet (the 3rd was an own goal). The third match against Catterick saw a convincing victory of 6-0 - goal scorers were Jamie (4) and Cameron (2). Sedgefield Youth FC finished joint first with Thornaby, but ended up second following a penalty shootout. Nevertheless, the tournament was great preparation for the season ahead.

The first game of the season was against Broughton Hibs. Ryan scored Sedgefield's first goal of the season, then Jamie scored two. Unfortunately, the team lost 3-4, due to what they all thought was an offside goal (I see they're getting into that habit early!). The Sedgefield players are looking forward to playing Broughton on their home ground. The club now has a page on Facebook (search for SYFC Sedgefield), so we can all keep an eye on their progress.

Sedgefield St Edmund's FC

It has been a reasonable start to the season for Sedgefield's leading Sunday league football team, St. Edmund's FC. With ten games played so far, they have won six, lost three and drawn one, and all three defeats have been close against very strong sides.

It wasn't the best start to the season, though, when St. Edmund's went out of the Alan Smith Cup 3-0 at Langley Park. Close defeats, home and away, to a strong Kelloe WMC in the league were disappointing, but home league victories against Pelton (2-1) and Ferryhill (1-0) have restored the balance. In addition, a 3-0 win against Washington JFC in the League Cup 3-0 has given the team plenty of optimism for the rest of the season.



Sedgefield Harriers

The Serpentine Trail Race The sun shone on Sedgefield Harriers' fourth annual Sedgefield Serpentine Trail Race on Sunday 12 September. No doubt aided by the good weather, the race had a record turnout of 123 runners, who followed a scenic 6.5 mile route on paths around Hardwick Park and Bishop Middleham, starting and finishing at Sedgefield Cricket Club. Terry Wall from Morpeth Harriers, who won the race in 2008 and 2009, defended his title with ease in an impressive time of 35:39. Andy Chadfield of Billingham Marsh House Harriers and James Askew of Newton Aycliffe AC were battling for second place when they took a wrong turn just before the end of the race, allowing Mike Jefferies of North York Moors to nip in ahead of them, with James and Andy coming third and fourth respectively. First lady home was Sarah Jane Oates from Crook AC in an excellent time of 46:19, followed by Sedgefield Harriers' Janet Raper and Alison Carter from Billingham Marsh House. The Ellen Timney Foundation

My Mam, Ellen Timney lived in Sedgefield for almost twenty years. When I was pregnant with my second child she was diagnosed with aggressive breast cancer. Mam was told not to bother with chemo as it would only raise her survival chance by another 5%. She fought to have chemo and it wasn't until 7 years later that the cancer came back, this time in her brain; cancer had also spread to her lungs, chest, bones and spine. Her first thoughts were for my Dad, Tony and the rest of our close family.

While her illness progressed, a close family friend, Ron Darby from Middlesbrough, approached Dad and I to see what we thought about a charity in Mam's name. Mam had always helped others in any way that she could; her last job was working with adults with learning disabilities, she would even visit them on Christmas day or her day off. When I was younger there was always somebody at the door needing help. Mam always said it cost nothing to give people your time.

At first, when Ron asked Mam what she thought about a foundation in her name, she thought it was a silly idea, but Ron managed to explain it to her. I think because of the tumour she didn't really understand what it was all about. It was her choice that the money raised would benefit sick and underprivileged children and also support children attending Lourdes. Mam fell in love with Lourdes and would talk about the terribly sick people that she met there, even though she was ill herself. Mam lost her battle with cancer on March 8th 2007, her last couple of weeks spent in the wonderful and supportive Sedgefield Community Hospital.

We have had unreal support from our local community and further afield, from others that knew Mam through Lourdes. So far the foundation has given about £14,000 to children. Although we are a small charity we aim to help as many as possible. Our last donation made it possible for twin boys with Down's Syndrome to attend Lourdes earlier this year. One of our earlier donations was to Robbie Jones from Bowburn, who lost his legs to meningitis. Mam also persuaded Sedgefield Town Council to host a day for children visiting from Belarus; the children visit the area for a couple of weeks, turning up with just the clothes they stand in.

Just before Mam was taken ill she put on a huge party tea for the children at Ceddesfeld hall. Although the children didn't speak any English, Mam seemed able to communicate so well with them. The foundation now supports their visit to Sedgefield and a wonderful fun filled day.

Sedgefield Blues Club

In response to letters in the last and previous issues re the use of the Blues Nights in the Parish Hall; everyone living in Sedgefield will know the problems and issues of noise from events in the Parish Hall over the last 12 years or so, and the severe limitations placed on all events in the Hall by Environmental Health Officers. As a result, the refurbishment carried out by the Town Council included acoustic walls, linings, sound absorption panels and a 'noise limiter' - all installed following expert advice

and recommendations. These, together with an excellent in house sound system have contributed to ensuring that the facility is now a first class venue for all our community groups and residents, and as a direct result the entertainment licence was issued without the former restrictions and limitations. There had been no noise problems/issues since the hall re-opened in May 2008 until a complaint was made directly to the Environmental Health Dept at **Durham County Council following** the first Blues Concert. Although the complaint was not followed up, it did prompt DCC Officers to start making enquiries re the noise levels in the Hall. The Town Council arranged for DCC officers to meet with the Round Table and organisers of the Blue Concerts to discuss the existing noise limiter and the levels etc. At that time the officers confirmed that the existing limiter is well suited for the hall and that another or additional one is neither needed nor necessary. The following week the same officers returned to the hall and the limit was set at 98db with the provision that it could be reduced if further complaints are received. For the not so technical minded, this is still very high. The Town Council continues to welcome all bookings for the hall, including the blues club, but all music must be played through the existing noise limiter which, after warnings, cuts out the music if and when the limit is reached. If this is not done and the equipment is interfered with (which has happened) or by-passed, this seriously jeopardises the use of the hall for everyone and can result in the entertainment licence being withdrawn which, as everyone can appreciate, will have serious consequences for all.
