Top of the league!

After consecutive years of dramatically improving GCSE results at Sedgefield Community College, this year's results saw the college achieve the accolade of being County Durham's highest attaining secondary school for the first time in its history. In a year when there has been much change in the education sector and a well publicised drive to reverse the so called 'dumbing down' of GCSEs, the GCSE results show the already impressive standards at Sedgefield Community College have risen yet again. In recent years, student performance at Sedgefield has led the school to be grouped amongst the highest achieving schools in the country, yet this year's GCSE results prove that there are no signs of complacency, as the school goes from strength to strength.

Headteacher Dave Davies is absolutely delighted for students and staff, who have worked so hard to produce this stunning performance. "Being top of the performance league table is a fantastic achievement at any time, but it is all the more satisfying in a year that has undoubtedly been one of the most challenging for schools for many years." He went on to explain that the reputation of the college now stretches beyond the local community. "In September we started the new school year with the biggest year seven intake the college has ever seen, and if there had been enough space we could have easily taken significantly more students such was the demand for places!" Asked why he thought Sedgefield was now so popular, Mr Davies said he believes that parents realise that the school now delivers consistently, not just in terms of examination performance, but in the way it cares for students and of course the quality of teaching. "It is this consistency which provides parents with the confidence

that they are making the right choice for their children."

Mr Davies reassured parents that in spite of reaching the top of the performance tables, the school is still focussed upon the next step. "We know that if we are to continue to provide an outstanding experience for our students we must continue to measure our performance with the best schools nationally not locally. Parents and future parents of students attending Sedgefield Community College, can be reassured that this attitude won't change."

Easy-access defibrillator installed

When someone goes into cardiac arrest, every minute without cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and defibrillation reduces their chance of survival by 10%. The first few minutes are absolutely crucial and immediate access to a defibrillator can be the difference between life and death.

Next time you pass Sedgefield Surgery, you may spot a large yellow box on the outside wall to the right of the entrance. That box holds a defibrillator, which has been secured for the community by Sedgefield Village Games (SVG). When the team behind SVG decided to continue to work on a range of projects in Sedgefield, one of the first ideas they decided to pursue was that of providing an easy to access defibrillator, situated in the centre of the village.


Funding for the equipment has come from SVG with Sedgefield Rotary, Sedgefield Escape, Right Lines Communications, Sedgefield Squash Club, Sedgefield Harriers and Sedgefield Surgery. Thanks to the support of the surgery, the defibrillator has now been installed and together with the North East Ambulance Service, SVG is in the process of arranging awareness and training events in Sedgefield. Look out for details of those events in next month's Sedgefield News. Of course, we hope that the defibrillator doesn't have to be used, but its presence adds to Sedgefield's healthcare resilience.

Sedgefield residents represent Great Britain at the Strakonice International Bagpipe Festival



Anthony & Heather Robb, with friends Alice Burn, Paul Knox and Neil Smith, joined international pipers from 16 countries at this wonderful festival in The Czech Republic. The large bronze statue of Strakonice's famous son, Schwanda the Bagpiper and its brewery named Dudak (bagpiper) which is the last one in the Czech Republic to be owned by a town, attest to the importance of bagpipes (and beer) to these townspeople. Their enthusiasm was demonstrated by 6-deep crowds lining the 1km route for opening and closing processions and their House of Culture, equivalent to our Ceddesfeld Hall, hosting dancing, singing and piping sessions well beyond dawn; us cautious Brits, however, were abed by 4:30! Much of the action took place in the 16th-century castle courtyard and the huge open-air cinema, these venues used simultaneously to accommodate 2000+ audiences with performers moving from one venue to the other to deliver their programmes. Equally impressive were the superb sound systems and stage crews which ensured that our small sweet Northumbrian pipes more than filled the venues whilst retaining their purity of tone. Less formal concerts took place at smaller stages around the town and we were also privileged to play in the main square of stunning Cesky Krumlov. It is not hard to see why the Strakonice Festival has UNESCO recognition and support. Here's hoping they won't have heard the last from Sedgefield!

Another successful Folk Festival

The ninth annual Sedgefield Folk Festival turned out to be the most successful to date with huge crowds attending all the concerts, singarounds and workshops. The Festival started on Thursday with a highly entertaining Music Hall and continued throughout the weekend with the main concerts, all of which were sell outs. The Festival goes from strength to strength and is now a well established feature on both the local and national folk scene. There were so many highlights over the weekend but mention must be made of a most wonderful performance from Kieron Goss and his wife Annie from Ireland who won the hearts of everyone in Sedgefield.

39th Sedgefield Drama Festival of One Act Plays



At another highly successful Festival, Sedgefield Players 'Primrose Way' won Best Production, Best Director (Thomas Guest) and Best Actress (Viv Jacobs). The play, 'Philip and Rowena', also by Sedgefield Players, won the award for Technical Presentation, while our youth section SPYS won the Ensemble Award for 'The Princess and the Wolf', written and directed by Tom Guest. Individual youth awards went to 17 year olds Noah Harrison and Natasha Graham of Saltburn '53 for outstanding performances in 'The Edge'. Their production also won the Audience Award, the Peter Young Quaich for Youth and the Best 30 Seconds for a jaw-dropping fall from the roof.

Scarborough group Bananadrama were runners up with their hard-hitting play set in a prison. The two protagonists Chris Parrinder and John Dennis won the Adjudicator's Award for their contrasted performances. Nunthorpe Players, returning to Sedgefield Festival after many years, won Best Set for their World War I play, 'Incorporeal Corporal'. Sarah Robinson won the Cameo Award for her gently touching performance as the wife.

Leyburn ADS won awards in each of their productions. The 1920s outfits in 'A Jolly Sinister Jape' won Jayne's Award for Costume, while Michael Waldman won Best Supporting Actor as John Shakespeare, father of the bard, in 'Gentlemen and Players'. Best Supporting Actress Annette Morris of Matchbox Theatre played two roles in 'Sanctuary', one at a week's notice. Best Actor David Irwin of Scarborough's Cresta ADS, played multiple roles in WLTM, a salutary, but very entertaining piece about blind dating, written and directed by Sue Wilding, who won the Endeavour Award for her original writing. Six of the twelve plays presented this year were written by members of the groups.

Adjudicator Colin Dolley was impressed by the wealth of original material, the scope and variety of the plays, the high standard of performance and the friendly, supportive spirit of the festival. Sedgefield Drama Festival is highly respected nationally, always held during the second week in September . We already have some good ideas for next year - our 40th! Residents' Forum Jottings from Sept 1st meeting.

There were the usual updates about ongoing issues but discussions were predominantly on two issues: 1. The ever increasing planning applications for houses in Sedgefield (currently in excess of 1000 new homes) at this meeting the application for housing on the '3 cornered field' was discussed. 2. The 'horse fair' held in the village over the Bank Holiday weekend.

After much discussion on each issue it was agreed that the Forum would submit an objection to any building on the '3 cornered field' and everyone was encouraged to submit their own objections.

In regard to the horse fair it was agreed the Forum submit freedom of Information requests to both Durham County Council (DCC) and the Police to establish how much the event had cost tax payers. It is particularly annoying that any events organised by our communities have strict regulations, time scales and costs attributed to them but the horse fair did not seem to have to abide by any such constraints even after an illegal entrance onto private land. It was also agreed that a letter of complaint be sent to DCC and Phil Wilson MP seeking assurance that the event would not take place in Sedgefield again.


DCC and the Police have attended a Town Council meeting to give an explanation of issues about the horse fair, they will also be attending the PACT meeting at the Neighbourhood Watch meeting on October 14th where residents will be able to ask questions.

The Examination in Public of the County Durham Plan will start on October 1st; (the Plan includes what development DCC say should happen in Sedgefield) The Forum have put in a lot of work to submit residents' views to the Inspector and will be attending several of the sessions to make verbal representation. The Forum had asked for one co-ordinated response to go forward on behalf of our community but this does not seem to be happening, the Town Council, Neighbourhood Plan group, Residents' Forum and individuals all have separate representation to the hearing.

What is really important is that we have a Neighbourhood Plan 'on paper' as soon as possible, so do attend any public meetings held by the Neighbourhood Plan Group to show support for the Plan residents want for Sedgefield.

One final word; congratulations to our schools. The Community College pupils and staff have excelled themselves with excellent results for another year. Our primary schools also have excellent results and continue to provide our young people with the grounding they need to succeed. Well done and thank you to all.

Next Forum meeting: November 3rd, 7pm in the Fletcher Room, Parish Hall. The AGM will also be held that night. Everyone is welcome.

The Sedgefield Plan

Sedgefield is a town under siege from the ambitions of landowners, developers and house builders who, if successful with their multiple applications, will build over a 1000 houses around our community. The Sedgefield Plan is the only way to curtail these ambitions and the adoption of a built-up area boundary is core to our strategy. In August, the community of Cuckfield in West Sussex adopted such a strategy, and it passed into law with a majority of 96% in their referendum. Since we started to work on The Sedgefield Plan we have struggled to find a way to be compliant with Durham County Council's core strategy and protect our village, a built-up area boundary is the only way.

We now have an application to build 47 houses on the Three Cornered field on Stockton road, an intrinsic part of our heritage. This is designated 'green wedge' which incidentally also includes the Eden Drive site. The county's own landscape report on the three cornered field acknowledges the green wedge and does not support building on it. The Council for the protection of rural England have also taken up our cause by including the Sedgefield green wedge in their submissions to the County Council's local plan examination in public, which begins on October 1st at the Riverside Cricket Ground, Chester le Street. We are making good progress with writing The Sedgefield Plan and although there is still much to do we are targeting late October to mid-November to submit it to DCC, where it will begin its journey to inspection and approval. We will publish a consultation draft in late October for which we will need your approval before we send our submission draft to the county; it will be published at

www.thesedgefieldplan.co.uk and we will let you know where you can see a copy. We need you to indicate your support so watch out for the announcement. David Bowles OBE. Chairman.

Dr Jones & Partners - Flu Campaign 2014

Our first flu drop in clinic was a great success - thanks to everyone who attended. But don't worry if you missed it. You have a second chance from 9am-11:30am on Saturday 11th October at Harbinson House, Sedgefield and Beveridge House, Fishburn. No appointment is needed and we aim to make your flu vaccination quick and efficient. The free vaccination is available to patients who are 65 years and older by 31st March 2015, pregnant women and patients with a serious medical condition such as chronic (long term) respiratory disease, e.g. severe asthma, COPD or bronchitis; chronic heart disease, chronic liver disease, chronic kidney disease; chronic neurological disease e.g. motor neurone disease, Parkinson's disease; diabetes; asplenia or dysfunction of the spleen; patients with weakened immune system due to disease/ treatment; people in long stay residential care home, and carers. The programme is also extended to all children aged 2, 3 and 4 years old (but not aged less than two or aged five or over) as at 1st September 2014 and once vaccines have been received we will hold dedicated sessions for eligible children. Details will be advertised locally, in surgeries and on our website www.doctorsnhs.co.uk. If you haven't attended the drop in clinic previously, why not give it a try? We look forward to welcoming you at the session. If you have any queries please ring your surgery and we will be pleased to assist you.

'She's Fired' Saturday 8th November

A performance of the musical narration about the 1880 Seaham mining disaster, written by Bob Lowery and John Wrightson, in Sedgefield Parish Hall. It was first performed at Sedgefield Folk Festival two years ago, since when further performances have taken place at various venues throughout the North East. Yet again, Durham County Cricket Club has delivered the goods, showing the rest of the professional sports teams in the North East how to earn silverware. After winning a third county championship last year, the club had a difficult start to this season. However, the last couple of months have seen a remarkable turnaround in form. The team has climbed out of relegation danger in the championship and progressed through the knock out stages of the 50 over one day cup. An incredible semi-final against Nottinghamshire at the Chester-le-Street ground saw Durham win after posting a daunting target of over 353, including an amazing 164 off 113 balls by Ben Stokes. The final at Lord's was a low scoring affair, with Durham restricting Warwickshire to 165, bowling them out with several overs to spare. The run chase was anything but straightforward and Durham lost early wickets. Despite this, Stokes and the veteran Gareth Breese got the team (packed with players who came up through the DCCC academy) over the line, securing the club's fifth major trophy since it became a first class county.

Maintenance of St Edmund's church

The last edition of Sedgefield News included a letter concerning the upkeep of St Edmund's Church. The leaflet from the Friends of St Edmund's spurred me to join them and to support the upkeep of this historical gem.

I tend to agree with A F Mowat, it is a great pity that churches are unable to fund their own buildings, and that the Church Commissioners are in the process of selling land for building against the wishes of local communities. I also find it difficult to accept that my own Roman Catholic Church seems to sit on money and valuables held in the Vatican that could be used to alleviate world poverty. But ultimately, two wrongs never make a right. Sedgefield Parish Church guards the religious history of this town. It has seen changes that we can hardly comprehend and affected the lives of countless individuals over the centuries. The building may in name belong to the Church of England, but in reality it belongs to all of us. There are few in this village who haven't wept at a funeral, smiled at a Christening or laughed at a wedding inside its walls, while wondering how many others have felt the same emotions while sitting or standing in the same spot. It really doesn't matter what faith we follow, St. Edmund's is now the symbol of a united community. The Friends of St Edmund's are a group of many faiths, perhaps none, who support this view and work hard to preserve a lovely building for our benefit. They are not "creeping round with a begging bowl" but fundraising at social events, the funds usually coming from among themselves. I am a regular worshipper at St John Fisher Church and support the upkeep of that church building, an ever more difficult exercise with dwindling regular congregations - the case with all churches today. I don't have any difficulty in supporting St Edmund's too, after all, the Friends are only asking for ± 25 a year. I am sorry that A F Mowat is offended by the leaflet. I am sure that was never its intent, but maybe his remarks should have been directed to the Church Commissioners and those who hold control of major financial assets, not to those trying to preserve a piece of historic architecture for us. Like him, I hope future generations can admire St Edmund's too. Angela Barron

In response to the letter in last month's Sedgefield News we would like to clarify some points. We receive no funding from the Church Commissioners (who manage the property assets of the Church of England) towards the maintenance of St Edmund's church building. The income from those assets goes to support the ministry of the church across England. The land close to Eden Drive owned by the Durham Diocese has not been sold. The site is now one of a number of proposals for new housing being considered. If it were to be sold the money would be used across the Diocese to help meet ministry costs.

Like all Church of England parish churches we depend on the generous financial support of local people.
