

Well, she's back! After 4 weeks living in a tent, teaching her new found African friends, Caroline is home with a new found sense of achievement and humility; achievement through having taught basic tasks to people whose everyday existence relies on a small helping of carbohydrate with a (very) occasional helping of meat; humility in having experienced the pleasure of people who have so little, enjoying life.

Caroline, along with another seven girls from Polam Hall School, Darlington, and four from Teesside High School, Eaglescliffe, flew from Heathrow on the 13th July, stopping at Nairobi en route to Lilomgwe airport, Malawi, where they arrived some 10 hours later.

Their first impression was that everything was small, including the people!

They travelled by bus from the airport to their first stop-over point. Kiboko camp Lilomgwe. Their first task was to split into 3 groups. Caroline's group task was to do their own shopping as they had to do their catering- living mainly on pasta. The Malawi people were extremely friendly, continually laughing waving to the newcomers.

Having settled in for the first two days, the first major task they had to tackle was to man (or woman) handle an old trailer onto the back of a truck and then clear the campsite of grass & brush, with an old kitchen knife. Here they worked with local people who showed them how the job should be done.

The highlight of the trip was their help in setting up a school. The girls had taken a collection of things with them to enable a village to do just that.

During this stage the girls continued working in 3 groups, but rotating through the groups, thus getting to know the other members and therefore working better as a team.

The third week they moved to climb Mount Mulanje, the highest peak in East Africa (3002m). The first day they climbed to a plateau and



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camped; the second day was spent walking to acclimatise. On the third and final day they set off at 5-30am to attempt to reach the top. At 2900m they ran out of time and so had to turn back- even so it was a remarkable achievement. The party then took up a number of projects. Caroline's group task was to act as tourists, so that the locals could set up their Bush walks and Safaris. The girls had the easy task of pointing out adjustments.

The final phase was relaxation in Liwande National park. Here they saw Hippos, Elephants, Impala and Bush Babies, along with Crocs, Snakes and an amazing assortment of insects. Finally they set off for home, via Nairobi to Heathrow, and the coach home- after a truly remarkable 4 weeks experience of "how the other half lives."

Caroline has a new pen pal, Edith, one of the students of Dzuela Second School; she intends to keep in touch and give advice whenever it is needed.

But who knows what the future might bring, the magical lure of Africa may beckon, again!

## Nags Head Victory in Local 'Ryder Cup'

Saturday July 13th saw Sedgefield's annual version of the Ryder Cup, when rival golfing societies from the Golden Lion and the Nag's Head met at Knotty Hill Golf Club to contest a competition which is now in its eighth year.

It was a perfect day for golf, with clear blue skies, warm sunshine, little breeze and receptive greens, and though the event may not figure in the calendar of notable golfing fixtures, the match was contested with considerable passion and skill. Expectations were high in both camps.

32 golfers participated in 8 matches, playing a four ball better ball Stableford format, and in a very closely fought contest in which each society won four games, the honours went to the Nag's Head with an accumulated points score of 339 to the Golden Lion's 332.

Over the eight years the competition has been running, the Nag's Head now hold a 5 to 3 advantage in games won. After the match both teams returned to the Golden Lion for refreshments and the presentation of the trophy to Mr. Michael Price, captain of the Nag's Head team. It was agreed by both societies that an excellent day had been enjoyed by all and long may the fixture continue.

Are you aware of the facilities there are in the Library, for your use? Are you aware of the services they can offer you? If not, then read on.............

Sedgefield Library has a stock of over 5000 books in the adult section and over 2000 in the children's section. These are available on loan for periods of up to 3 weeks.

There is a reading area where one can peruse the books before choosing and where The Northern Echo is available to read. They also have a fairly comprehensive Spoken Word section for anyone with difficulties!

The Library is managed by Librarian, Judith Machin, with 2 full time and 2 part time assistants. Judith is also Group Manager for Sedgefield, Trimdon and Wingate, plus the mobile Library van. This group was set up in 1997 to offer a better choice of shared service to the communities.

Beside a vast stock of books, the Library also provides an information service; whether you need a telephone directory, a bus time table or an Encyclopaedia, it is all there; a full compliment of leaflets and brochures allows you to plan outside activities and/or visits to exciting places! You can even buy books, use their photocopier or hold a meeting or an exhibition (contact Judith); even have a cup of coffee on Friday mornings.

Their Information Technology is second to none,. You can surf the internet or email to all of your friends using their 2 PC.s and it's all free of

charge - just book in advance to ensure your place.

During School holidays the Library staff organise activities for the children, with competitions to keep them interested.

At the meeting held on Tuesday 6th August 2002, the following is a resume of the minutes. The Minutes of previous meeting were accepted.

There were no matters arising.

Village Constable- read Keith Todd's column!

<u>Crime Prevention</u> - Neil Langthorne apologised for the confusion arising from a meeting of the Burglary Action Group. In the Northern Echo's report the reference should have been Sedgefield Borough-as this caused confusion amongst our members when only Sedgefield was printed. The Reporter has since apologised to our Chairman.

<u>NHW Co-Ordinator</u>, Sarah Norman thanked the Panel for inviting her to present the Alan Sowerby Memorial Awards at the 2 Junior Schools

<u>Community Force</u>- their representative, Tim Speary reported that requests for assistance from Sedgefield Village had increased after the article published in the previous issue of this paper. Reminder that their Tel. 01388 721351

Sedgefield Show. The Chairman requested more tombola prizes and more volunteers.

<u>Spennymoor First Responders</u>. It is reported that this team has folded, it was therefore decided that as soon as sufficient proof is at hand to this effect, the monies held by the Alan Sowerby Memorial fund will be presented to Sedgefield First Responders to do with as they see fit.

<u>Door Bars</u> are available from this panel at £1 each, to any Villager who requires them and will be fitted free of charge. Please contact your local NHW representative, or Chairman Ken Saiger on Tel: 621896.

<u>Data-Link</u>. Age Concern is interested in this system and hopes to offer them to "vulnerable" people throughout the County, free of charge. To this effect David Hillerby will attend a meeting with them on 22nd August- (report in next months Sedgefield News).

<u>Village Crime Figures (including Winterton Park, Industrial Estate and outlying Farms).</u> For period 12th June to 6th August 2002 there were 17 reported crimes.

There was one most serious case of Assault on a female person. When a man attempted to sexually assault her, the lady punched the attacker and he ran off! Well done!!

One attempted burglary at Winterton Cottages- 2 persons disturbed and ran off.

2 cases of criminal damage. Fire damage to tarmac at Rectory Row School shortly after it had been renewed, and a window broken in East Parade- 2 arrests £30 compensation has been paid.

8 cases of theft from outside the Village

5 cases of theft in the Village; (alloy wheels from Pine Ridge, a child's bike from The Meadows and 3 cases of garden furniture stolen, referred to by P.C. Todd in his column).

NHW would like all the Villagers to be aware that they will receive a visit from their local co-ordinator shortly, to invite them to have a SMOKE DETECTOR fitted free, where one is required. The Community Force or the Fire Brigade will do the actual fitting, and will install the batteries, which will either be of 5 year guaranteed life or even 10 years (they are not sure yet). Householders will be able to have up to a total of 2 per property, supplied free by H.M.Government.

Sedgefield Show. Despite the atrocious weather, due to the efforts of our volunteers, we still managed to raise over £200

### P.C. Todd's Column.

We may be damp and wet, as visitors to the Agricultural Show on Saturday 10th August will testify, but this is summer (with a capital S(?))! A time when we can sit in our gardens and enjoy the fruits of our labour, digging, planting, pruning. Not forgetting the expense of flower pots, garden furniture and ornaments- all a distant memory after some nocturnal scavenger, sneaking around at night, is only too happy to help himself to them, thereby spoiling our enjoyment! This is exactly what happened a few weeks ago. We know of 5 gardens, which had visitors through the night (there maybe more who haven't reported it). Eden Drive, The Meadows and Thurlow Grange were the targets. Among the items stolen were, a Garden bench, tubs of

flowers, a stone birdbath and even a birdcage (although I'm not sure if there was a bird inside it). The point is, that gardens are easy pickings for these people. The goods taken are usually sold at boot fairs to an eager public, wanting to improve their own gardens (although a couple in Hartlepool have been charged recently with having a garden full of stolen objects). What can we do to stop it? Other than the obvious, like putting the items away or securing them to the floor, if at all practical, then we could frustrate the thief by painting or scratching our name or post code onto the item. This will make it more difficult for the thief to dispose of the item and easier for the Police to catch him! With a little bit of imagination, you won't become a

victim next time he calls.

SCHOOL WATCH We are currently running this annual scheme through the summer holiday. So far, so good; our schools have not suffered any damage to date. However, I must remind our younger readers that they are NOT allowed to meet their friends on school property! I would like to thank all the residents who spoke to me at the show. Despite the weather, my FARM WATCH initiative was well received and many local farmers signed up for it! ### (Community and Voluntary Organisation Sedgefield)

CAVOS held a Community Forum at the Sedgefield Parish Hall in July.

This was an opportunity for local inhabitants and organisations to come along and hear a presentation by Anne Frizell, the Community Network

Co-ordinator. In addition, to discuss any training or grants which they might need for their organisations. The meeting was attended by a relatively small number of people.

Representatives from the CAVOS Community Network have recently had the opportunity to visit the five group areas in the borough. The groups were Ferryhill Chilton & West Cornforth, Newton Aycliffe, Sedgefield, Fishburn & The Trimdons, Shildon and Spennymoor.

The tour guides for the areas were the local representatives of the Forum. Opportunities were given to see and hear about the best and the worst in each area. This will be very helpful for the network team in future decision -making. The tour for Sedgefield took place on the 8th of August, with Colin Richmond as your local CAVOS representative.

### **Partnership Wins Major Grant**

Sedgefield Development partnership has been awarded a grant of over £20,000 by the Learning & Skills Council to bring Lifelong Learning opportunities to Sedgefield. This follows a grant made to the Partnership last year, which was used to identify the kind of demand existing in the village surrounding area. Many of you helped with that research by returning your questionnaires and the new grant will enable the Partnership to meet your priorities. The emphasis will be on making these opportunities available within village

Roger Clubley, Chairman of the Partnership said "competition for these grants was very great and it is an endorsement of our efforts last year that we have been backed to this extent. We are looking forward to bringing to the villages the kind of learning that people most want and

making it available at convenient times and places".

SDP expects to recruit a project co-ordinator as soon as possible and will also be working with its partners, Sedgefield Community College, Bishop Auckland College, SCA and others, to make the project sustainable in the longer term.

### Sedgefield artist at the DLI

Amateur artist Les Joss has been offered an exhibition of his paintings and drawings at the DLI Museum and Durham Art Gallery at Ayckley Heads in Durham City. The former deputy head and teacher of mathematics at Wellfield School admits to being besotted by steam power from an early age, but says he's not an 'anorak'. His wife, Lorna may disagree with the latter!

Now retired, Les has much more time to spend visiting preserved railways and indulging his other hobby, painting and drawing. Not surprisingly then, his exhibition is entitled 'Days of Steam', and includes watercolour, gouache, oil and acrylic paintings and pencil drawings of steam driven transport (mainly locomotives) from the 1950s and 60s.

Subjects range from the Humber Ferry paddle steamer Wingfield Castle, now in Hartlepool Marina, to a British Railways Standard 9F locomotive hauling iron ore to Consett.

These "nostalgic recollections of a misspent youth" (the words of the artist, not the editor!) can be seen in the Print Room of the gallery from 17th September until 6th October.
