

I must admit that I approached with a little trepidation, because when it was a Jeweller's shop, I couldn't really get in because of a tight turn into the shop (I tend to take paint off walls or damage my wheelchair in tight situations). But when I arrived I was greeted by the friendly and familiar faces of Roger and Sandy Clubley, who showed round.

The turn into the shop was tight but I quickly saw that it was not going to be the problem I had envisaged – there was access through the door without having to manoeuvre my wheelchair - and I was amazed by the floor area available with all the fixtures and fittings removed.

I got in quite easily (the entrance needs no ramp) and inside I met John Parkinson, busy sizing up the toilet area, which because of its shape will need to be carefully thought out and adjusted. John seems willing and able to overcome any obstacle. I gave a little input, but I have no

worries because he has everything under control.

Seeing how things were coming on, I signed up verbally for a computer course, only to be told by John that I'm second on the list! Joking apart, I was very impressed. Nothing is ever going to be perfect; the offices are upstairs (some things are unavoidable) but I know that if the people working in the office are as accommodating as those working to get everything up and running, they will take having to come downstairs to see less able bodied people, in their stride. I am really looking forward to the grand opening and to resuming my learning opportunities. I add my thanks to Barclays and the team of volunteers who are working so hard to get the work done. Good luck to everyone involved in the venture!

#### Pensioners urged - PICK IT UP, IT'S YOURS

Pensioners in the Sedgefield area of County Durham are being urged to pick up a new pension credit. A '*Pick It Up, It's Yours*' campaign was launched in the Sedgefield Borough in August to ensure pensioners claim money to which they are entitled.

Organised by County Durham Partners Against Poverty the campaign aims to reach pensioners in the Sedgefield area who have not yet made a claim for Pension Credit. An 'Information Bus' will visit villages in the Sedgefield borough area over the coming weeks.

Councillor John Davies, Durham County Council Cabinet Member for Community Development said "This campaign is aimed at all the people who still have not claimed the Pension Credit to which they may be entitled. Estimates suggest that 25% of pensioners already in receipt of Housing and Council Tax Benefit living in Sedgefield have yet to make their application for Pension Credit."

The new Pension Credit can be claimed by people who have savings or a small works or private pension. To make a claim by telephone, ring 0800 99 1234. Those with speech or hearing difficulties can textphone 0800 169 0133.

#### Hydrotherapy centre for dogs launched at Butterwick Boarding Kennels

The area's first purpose built hydrotherapy centre for dogs opens on 1<sup>st</sup> September. With the 14ft by 10ft pool and grooming department, the centre offers a range of exercise rehabilitation and pampering programs for dogs of all levels of health and fitness. The heated and filtered hydrotherapy pool is an ideal way for dogs to enjoy exercise, its controlled environment making it ideal for rehabilitation after an operation or illness. The anti-swim jet controls allow the water resistance to change from slight current to white water. Buoyancy aids are available for nervous or very lame dogs, which can access the pool via a ramp or a specially developed hoist. To add extra support they can be joined in the pool by the kennel's qualified hydrotherapist. After the pool dogs can enjoy a post-swim pampering session, with bathing, drying and clipping.

The centre is run by Mark and Francesca Harding, who offer boarding for 55 dogs and 16 cats, 365 days a year with fully qualified staff on hand 24 hours a day. It is one of the few kennels which offers secure

dog walking facilities and care for animals that may be on medication or under veterinary supervision. Francesca said "We want to be more than just a runof-the-mill boarding kennels. We offer people's pets the best care and attention possible. The hydrotherapy pool together with the grooming salon is a real chance for dogs to get valuable structured exercise and the kind of pampering everyone, human or animal, loves to receive." The response from customers has been positive, people recognizing that exercise is important to dogs - muscle wastage can occur after just 3 days of a dog not being exercised. Swimming is a gentle way to regain fitness and the hydrotherapy pool provides an alternative way for dog owners to keep their pets fit in a controlled, high quality environment. It is ideal for dogs that are hip displasic, pre & post surgery and/or overweight.

Mark adds "It is shocking and worrying that 50% of dogs in the UK are clinically obese. The right diet, exercise and care can work wonders; just ask your vet!"

#### Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crimewatch Panel

Minutes of Meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> August 2004 Minutes of Previous Meeting: (08/06/04) approved. Secretary's Report: Details of correspondence issued and received. Points of note were: 1) Rent for Hall is to increase due to addition of VAT. 2) Council require details of our Insurance cover. 3) Cheque for CO monitors received. 4) Panel is affiliated to National NHWatch & is covered by their "umbrella" Ins. policy. 5) Nat. NHWatch is presently in funding difficulties & is at loggerheads with the Home Office. Representative Reports: Village Constable: Apologies received, no report available. CPO: Neil gave details regarding burglary (his special area of responsibility) & improvements to investigating & recording aspects; more use of civilian employees some uniformed; of delivery of CCTV vehicle; recent SPARC meeting. Neil further advised that use of one telephone number nationally to call your local (nearest) Police contact station was gathering favour within the force. Chair queried whether this would remove the need to hold back on replacing the "Phone stickers" due to be replaced as a result of recent "local" phone change - to be followed up. Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Apologies received. Neil gave details of Sarah's work to support Durham Enterprise School's summer school. **Community Force:** Tim distributed copies of Task log, which includes our Village, responded to queries, & described improvements for future reports. Members thanked him for Community Force's rapid response & his personal contribution within the village. Following members concerns about lack of Police support to residents' requests, Chair asked if Community Force would become proactive in the Park View area (tree fire damaged & foil wrappers left in area). Tim was thanked personally for the extra help he provided to her, in sourcing & fitting security to suit her particular door problem.

**Ring Round:** It was stated that this system, set up by the Police and designed to "Notify residents quickly of events that are of urgent need for notification & circulation" is simply not working. This was resoundingly confirmed by all present. A vigorous debate ensued, the Chair pointing out how DCI C Pearson had promised all Officers to be trained & to resolve this ongoing problem 2 years ago; & with Neil raising the prospect for a few nominated N/H/Watch members possibly being trained to initiate messages. There was only one member present willing to "consider" this means to resolve the ongoing communication downfall in our village. Life Membership: Chair gave details of this award following July Executive meeting and how he had the pleasure of issuing the first such award to Stan Moyle in his home last week. He recorded how appreciative Stan was of the Panel for the unexpected recognition.

Phone Stickers: Chair to follow up with Sarah. Personal Alarms: It was agreed these should be offered free to all residents over 70 who apply. School Walking Bus: Chair following suggestion from Tim proposed sponsorship for reflective clothing for children. A member said this already exists and offered to liase with C/man re this topic. Thorpe Thewles NHWatch: Chair gave an update of assistance given to some residents following contact at Medieval Fayre; confirming that they would be totally independent of our Panel.

**Constitution Change**: C/man gave notice of intended change at AGM re membership. **Resident Thanks**: A member present wished to record their personal gratitude to the Panel for effort and assistance given regarding door security and told of how beneficial this has been. **Raffle** Held after the meeting raised £16.00. **Next Meeting- includes AGM:**

#### The Driver

Why, in a 70mph zone, drive at 80mph - in a 60 mph zone, at 70 - in a 40mph zone, at 50, in a 30mph zone at 40? Is it because you need to prove to yourself you're quicker than anyone else? Well, you're not unique. Most people do the same! Psychologists have been trying to fathom this out for years, with little success. Why drive so close to the vehicle in front? Well,

why drive so close to the vehicle in front? Well, most people don't know what "too close" is. Most haven't been in a situation where they've had an accident - yet - but they might. So **please observe the 2 second rule**. Check the vehicle in front against a stationary object - a lamp post or traffic sign (don't forget to read it as well) then count to 2. If you pass the sign before you can say "ONE, TWO" you're too close. It doesn't matter what the speed is, it is compensated in the 2 seconds. Finally this month, a question for the Government. How do you cut the number of deaths on the road and save fuel at the same time? **Answer -** all vehicles should have a MAXIMUM SPEED set at the Maximum Speed Limit.

**Your chance to quit!** The Passport to Health Smoking Cessation Project has helped over a hundred people to stop smoking since January, running courses in community settings to offer support and advice for smokers who want to quit the habit.

Annie Pluse explains "When you book a course, you fill in a form telling me what kind of smoker you are. Then I can advise you of the best type of product to use to help you stop, for instance, a patch, some gum, or even Zyban, which could be discussed further with your GP. You are given a Nicotine Replacement Therapy Voucher which entitles you to your first month of product for the price of 1 prescription. You then collect your product and set your own quit date. You will be able to try out new ideas and meet other people experiencing what you are going through".

#### **Citizens Advice: banking**

"I've been told I need to open a bank account so that my benefits can be paid into it. But I'm really worried that I will go overdrawn as I'm not very good with money. What are the options for me?"

Some bank accounts can help vou to take control of your money. Although a full current account with debit card and overdraft facility can be more difficult, the 'basic bank account' is simple to manage. You can pay money in, set up standing orders and direct debits and get money out using a cash card. Most importantly you cannot go overdrawn. You can even withdraw money from some basic bank accounts at a Post Office counter. It costs nothing to open a basic bank account but if you do not have enough money in it to pay direct debits that have been set up, you could be charged. Another option may be a Post Office card account. Almost anyone can open one of these but they can only be used to collect benefits, tax credits and state pensions. You can't pay any other money in, can't go overdrawn and you can only use vour card at a Post Office. If you have an overdraft on your current account or debts to your bank and you open a basic bank account at the same bank or building society, they may use money in your new account to pay this off. Open an account in a different bank or building society or use a Post Office card account if you're worried that your benefits may be swallowed up in this way. #### COOK'S CORNER Aubergine & Pepper Pasta Bake

(serves 4-6 people) 2 tbs/30 ml sunflower oil Large onion (chopped) 4 cloves of garlic (crushed) 2 tbs dried basil 1 large aubergine (sliced) 2 peppers (sliced) 800gm/1lb tinned tomatoes (chopped) 8 tbs tomato puree Half pint/280 ml stock 6oz/175g wholewheat pasta twists (uncooked) Preheat oven to 400F/200C/ gas mark 6 Cook onions, garlic and dried basil in pan with lid, until soft Wash aubergine thoroughly & cut slices into guarters Add aubergines, pepper and chopped tomatoes to pan & leave on heat until just cooked Whilst aubergine is cooking, bring pan of water to boil & cook pasta until slightly under-cooked. Drain, rinse in cold water and add to pan Dissolve tomato puree in stock & add. Stir gently & add salt to taste. Pour into greased ovenproof dish & bake 30 min. (The Treehouse Cookbook)

As far as Sedgefield News is aware, the village has four Sunday teams competing in various leagues this year, representing St. Edmund's, the Golden Lion, the Black Lion and the Cross Hills. Please put us right if you know of others!

The first few games have brought mixed fortunes. St Edmund's kicked off their season with a resounding 11-1 victory in of the various cups they enter, but then lost their first league game 3-2 in a hard fought mid-week game against a team from Spennymoor.

Last year, the team now representing the Golden Lion (and sponsored by Carpets at Home as reported in the newsletter) had a very difficult first season and finished bottom of the two Trimdon and District leagues. This time around, the leagues have been amalgamated into one and the Golden Lion have started in much more encouraging fashion. #### **Expert Patients Programme group celebrates**



At the end of the 20<sup>th</sup> century the British Government faced a dilemma. The number of people living with chronic conditions had escalated and an effective and cost-efficient service was needed to improve their lives. A task force was set up to design an Expert Patients Programme, and in Sedgefield locality it was launched in 2002, supported by The Pioneering Care Partnership and Sedgefield Primary Care Trust.

Since then over 100 people have completed the six week course, 4 volunteer tutors who also live with chronic conditions have been trained and fully accredited. The course is free and held over six weeks for 2 ½ hours per week for people living with long-term health conditions such as Heart Disease, Arthritis, Multiple Sclerosis, Diabetes, Back Pain, Mental Illness, Asthma, HIV and others.

Five skills are taught: Problem solving, Decisionmaking, Using resources, Effective links with health care providers and Taking action Benefits include a significant reduction in pain, depression, breathlessness and 'lack of energy' and an increase in confidence levels and preparedness for consultations with health care professionals. Days off work show a significant reduction too.

In July, around 20 participants celebrated successful completion of the course and were awarded certificates by Gloria Wills, Sedgefield PCT Chair.

### Old Beacon Lane: the voice of the Gypsy Women

The National Association of Gypsy Women would like to reiterate our position and make clear to all on the Beacon Lane issue that contrary to local media speculation, under no circumstances would we be in agreement or favour of blocking off Beacon Lane.

As we stated at the meeting in Sedgefield parish hall on the 14<sup>th</sup> July 2004, this would only be acceptable if there was a designated safe alternative to Beacon Lane targeted for Gypsy Travellers to go to when coming to the area. This would allow them to pursue their cultural way of life without interference or discrimination. We have spoken to village residents and discovered that some people who are coming to Beacon Lane are causing a disturbance, residing in 'buses' and 'old transit vans'. These people are not of our culture, but are from the non Gypsy Traveller Community.

The national association of Gypsy Women would be happy to help, speak to the Gypsy Traveller communities when they come to stay in the area and reiterate to them an expected code of behaviour. As with the non Gypsy community there are good and bad in all cultures. Our community are reasonable and are willing to work to come to an acceptable conclusion for all concerned. We seek only reasonable, peaceful and good relations with the wider communities and work endlessly to achieve this end.

The curse of wind farms!

I was appalled recently to receive a glossy communication through my door entitled "Walkway Wind Farm". This proposes the building of another eight 130 m high turbines on a site near to the Castle Eden Walkway. We already have 3 of these monstrosities, sited near to Elwick, which are very visible from the walkway. Another eight would be a visual disaster.

Dr David Bellamy is totally opposed to the epidemic of wind turbines, as are a number of other academics who have realised that global warming is, largely, a natural phenomenon which is little affected by man's activities. Wind farms are a very expensive way of generating electricity, the cost being at least 4 times that of conventional methods. France has quietly lead the way in green electricity generation; it has many nuclear stations which not only satisfy its own needs but supply a large part of Italy as well as exporting to this country. This, surely, is a much more effective (& non-carbon dioxide producing) alternative to coal, oil & gas.
