The Quality Practice Award

Dr Jones and Partners practice serves our community from surgeries in Sedgefield, Fishburn, Trimdon Village and Trimdon Colliery and it strives to provide the best professional medical care possible to the 15,400 patients on its list, by pursuing innovative policies and fostering an ethos of continuous development.

Way back in January 2008, the partners decided to apply for the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) Quality Practice Award (QPA), to gain recognition from a respected external body that all procedures, protocols and current medical knowledge were up to date and as efficient as the practice could make them.

The QPA is an in depth study of the medical, managerial and administrative ability of the organisation. It is an 18 month long process and involves all members of the practice team submitting 21 chapters of evidence to a scrutinising committee. The process culminates in a whole day visit by an assessment team appointed by the RCGP. The team is composed of a general practitioner, a practice manager, a practice nurse and a lay member, all trained volunteers from other parts of the country. At the end of the visit the team decides whether or not the practice is deemed worthy of the award. Happily, our local practice has been granted the award (which lasts for 5 years) for the second time, and they are especially pleased that the official assessors' report was wholly positive about all aspects examined.

At the time of writing, the intention is to ask Father John Caden to officially present the practice with its handsome plaques in the week commencing 21 September, when everyone has returned from their holidays.

More Wartime Tales

After Mr Bayston's item on the Royal Observer Corps last month, we have received a fascinating account of the bombing incident mentioned in his last paragraph. Locations are added, in brackets, from an explanatory sketch provided with the letter. With the incident still vivid in his memory after 67 years, Mr Les Butler writes:

"This was the adventure of my wife and I and another man living here in Sedgefield today - Mr J. Hill. One night in 1942 we were at our Thursday night dance in the NAAFFI, Hardwick Camp [*behind the trees on Durham Road*]. The siren went at 8pm and at about 10 o'clock I said to my girl (now my wife) - better get your coat as the all clear has not sounded, and I'll see you home. We got as far as the camp entrance and all hell let loose. Our searchlight at the Kennels site was on target. He had jerry hooked in his beam by radar and a bofor's gun on our square was pumping shells. We got caught up in a hail of shrapnel which was dropping around our feet as we ran up towards the village. When we got as far as the Black Lion corner this whistle was heard, and one big bang, that lifted us across the road from the blast.

The bomb landed where the [*Hardwick*] school was built years later. The window on the staircase of the big house opposite the camp was blown in and some of the people's faces in the old council houses [*between The Lane and Beech Oval*] were blackened by soot from the chimneys. I think our lives were saved by the large number of trees growing right down Durham Road. The wall along the Isolation Hospital [*now Neville Drive and The Gables*] was peppered by the shrapnel."

Some of the money raised will go towards setting up a Treatment room at to help carers relax.

She says "I want to raise awareness of Autism and Daisy Chain. When a 12 year old girl contemplates suicide and her mother is so despairing of what she can do that she herself contemplates double suicide it must be bad. Without Daisy Chain that mother and daughter would most probably not be here; heartbreaking!" Sunshine Brings Crowds to Sedgefield Show

The 156th Annual Sedgefield and District Agricultural and Horticultural Show brought record crowds and exhibitors on Saturday 8th August. Hailed as one of the best yet, the event saw visitors from the local area and from as far afield as Whitby, Halifax, Northumberland, Durham and the Yorkshire Dales.

Entries to most of the categories surged from previous years, which gave the thousands of visitors plenty to see. There were strong cattle and sheep classes as well as goats on display for the first time in many years, which proved particularly popular for children and adult visitors alike.

Exhibitions by rural rangers, forestry horses, Sedgefield Young Farmers and vintage tractor owners surrounded the main ring, where hounds from the South Durham Hunt made a late appearance following a busy programme of show jumping, handling and pony sports.

Traders in the food marquee had a particularly successful day selling cakes, honey, liqueurs, home made fudges and preserves. In the craft marquee, displays of bespoke wood craft, paintings and photographs and rug making all reported high interest from visitors.

This year's new addition, live acoustic music played by various regional amateur musicians, proved extremely popular with people who wanted to just sit, listen and enjoy the sunshine with a cool refreshment in their hand! The fairground rides also proved to be a big hit with young and old.

The huge crowds also benefited the Sedgefield area with local businesses reporting a steady trade throughout the day in the village.

Show Chairman, Ian Mason commented: "We were pleased to see the sun shining after a run of poor weather in recent years, it really does make all of the difference and ensured that visitors, exhibitors and organizers alike had a good day." He added: "The aim of the Show is to bring agriculture, country pursuits, business and the local community together and we think we have achieved that in 2009. I personally would like to express huge thanks to everyone who was involved in the successful organization of this year's show and to all of those who came along on the day. The support from sponsors and individuals also ensures our event is a success – people make successful things happen." Sedgefield Mayor Sheila Sutherland was in attendance and presented prizes and trophies. She commented: "Events like these are good for the community because they bring people together."

Community SAFETY

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Minutes of Meeting held on 11th August 2009

1. Minutes of Previous Meeting, 9/06/2009 were accepted & approved as a true record.

2. Matters Arising (prev.4a) Dog Bins: Tim reported on progress. C/Man expressed surprise & dissatisfaction that Durham CC cannot fund 1 more bin for Sedgefield on the site agreed at the June meeting. Members reaffirmed that dog dirt still a big problem: vice C/man agreed, commenting that there was scope to review bin placements across the Town as a whole to better utilise their present distribution. It was agreed that the Secretary should write to DCC to request additional bin and ascertain County position on bin and resource allocation to dog fouling in Sedgefield.

(prev.6.2) Alcohol Ban in Public Places (Sedgefield Village): Res. Forum Chair reported she had written to the Chief Constable and has received neither acknowledgement or a reply. She had attended the last Town Council meeting and presented **evidence of successful Durham bans** and of successes from other English locations. Town Council had not accepted this evidence; they *had* accepted guidance from one Councillor who said it was not viable pursuing a ban in Sedgefield. Res. Forum Chair asked members present to report their observations/problems to Police & Town Council **in person**; as their (the Police & Town Council's) recorded view of the drink related intimidation/nuisances in Sedgefield is that it is minimal and so not worth even considering this course of action. Members took the view that the problem does exist and does warrant proper consideration of this course of action.

3 Treas. & Sec'y gave reports. Secretary informed members that following Councillor Alan Blakemore's advice at the last meeting, a successful application for room hire costs had been made to Durham Community Force. Cheque had been banked promptly. Many thanks to Alan.

4. Representative Reports: a) Community Force: Tim Spearey provided a comprehensive report covering period 2/6 - 11/8/09. 31 events detailed. Issues included antisocial behaviour, youth drinking, general drunken behaviour, pub issues, noise, drugs (substance misuse), schools premises abuse/damage, dog fouling.

b) Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator & c) Crime Prevention Officer: Neil Langthorne gave details of his replacement as CPO, PC Keith Lounds who will be in post by 15th Sept. allowing Neil to transfer to post of Community Liaison Officer. Neil reported on a new proactive strategy to catch criminals in our area, which has just "nabbed" two burglars. The scheme will not only target property criminals but car criminals too. Members were delighted to learn of this approach. The Crime Ring System presently used may benefit by a new replacement, if a recent bid for funds is successful, hopefully we will know by next Panel meeting (in October).

5 A.O.B. 5.1 Julia Bowles informed members that she had been elected as a member of the public to the new Area Action Forum for the area that includes Sedgefield, & noted that this group includes our local Police Community Inspector Andy Neill.

5.2 Alan Sowerby Citizenship Award 2009: Secretary reported on this year's extremely successful awards at both Primary Schools. A member queried the award for the Community College, the C/man explained that despite best efforts made by the Executive and latterly himself (last year) it would appear the College did not wish to maintain this award. Should they wish to start again (for a 3rd time) N/H/Watch would be happy to participate.

6.0 PACT meeting / Police reports: 6.1 PCSO Gavin Rutter & Amy Coulson introduced themselves to members; Amy will replace Gavin when he moves on to become a full time Police Officer (for Cleveland) in the near future.

6.2 Recorded Crime Report 9/6 - 11/8/09 Keith pointed out from 9th - 27th June there was **NO** recorded crime in our village; however from 28th June to 11th Aug 15 crimes were recorded, comprising 4 Thefts, 9 Damage & 2 Burglaries (non dwelling). As previously requested by members, Keith provided details of the number of calls received by Police from within the village over the last 2 months; this was much appreciated by the members & very helpful.

Keith explained why 2 assaults that had taken place were not included in the figures (victims will not report it). Keith also advised that 6 youths were arrested on criminal damage charges for Rectory Row school damage; the newly installed CCTV system has already proved itself to be a great success. Questioned by a young person present regarding increase in crime during summer holidays, Keith confirmed that crime is actually reducing in the village especially when compared to a few years ago. Two guests from Foxton were concerned for an increase in thefts/crime in their area, Keith is to follow up.

6.3 P.A.C.T. Keith took members through the purpose of PACT, a principle cornerstone being to agree the main priorities for the Beat Team to tackle for the next month. *[Priorities from both last month's meeting at Residents' Forum and from this month, are in the right hand column. Ed.]* Keith took members through in detail what had been done & results so far and sought discussion from members present. A member responding stated that it appeared that only one of the pubs observed could be said to have taken any real measures to reduce the glass problem and as such the "Hope & Landlord" is to be commended. Meeting closed at 8.40 p.m.

The next meeting, on Tuesday 13th October, includes the AGM.

PC Todd reports

In recent issues of Sedgefield News I have focussed on the mindless damage being caused to Sedgefield Primary School. Recently, youths were arrested and charges are expected. The school has now installed CCTV, which will identify anyone stupid enough to trespass on the grounds or cause damage.

Other crimes recently reported include 4 tyres slashed on the Industrial Estate, and damage to cars in West Park Lane and White House Drive. A flower tub was stolen from a garden in Wykes Close and a tent damaged in the Garth.

Pub Watch

No issues were raised requiring further action at the recent meeting held in the Golden Lion. Last month's PACT priorities were discussed at length; the issue of glasses and noise coming from member premises. It was agreed that plastic glasses should be issued for outside use, but this requires the cooperation of customers, to assist in making our streets a safer and more enjoyable environment.

PACT meeting

This was held at the end of the Crime Watch meeting. Those present were informed of the results of the previous month's priorities, which included reports of loud music being played from a car on the High Street and an intoxicated, topless male climbing onto the telephone kiosk on High Street. This month's priorities have been agreed and will be the focus of attention for the beat team during the month. They are;

Glasses: to continue monitoring pubs to reduce the number of glasses being used outside on the street.

Anti-social behaviour: to monitor the noise & behaviour of customers at the Pizza Shop on Front Street, especially late at night.

Illegal parking outside Sainsbury's, North End: to monitor the area and prosecute offenders.

Alan Sowerby Citizenship Awards 2009

Hardwick Primary School

On Tuesday 21st July at Hardwick Primary School a Special Assembly was held to present 3 awards prior to the annual leavers' awards ceremony the following day. Deputy Head Teacher Sarah Guest introduced this year's special ceremony by reminding everyone of the background and reasons for introducing the commemorative Alan Sowerby Citizenship award into Sedgefield schools, and one that is made annually from the village Neighbourhood Watch volunteers. She explained that this year the school had decided to add two more awards, one for Citizenship to a Key Stage 1 pupil and the second to a pupil for showing an Outstanding Attitude to Learning.

The Key Stage 1 Citizenship went to year 2 pupil Eleanor James. Mrs Guest described Eleanor as a gentle, quiet girl who is thoughtful, considerate and always kind. Eleanor has overcome natural shyness to show her true colours when helping new children to settle into school, said Mrs Guest before presenting her with a certificate and plaque.

The award for Outstanding Attitude to Learning was presented to year 6 pupil Harry Chadwick - a lively, happy boy who consistently displays enthusiasm and a good sense of humour, said Mrs. Guest. Harry, a worthy winner, has maintained a positive approach to all learning situations and has consistently worked hard through each of his years at Hardwick School.

The Alan Sowerby Citizenship Award 2009 went to year 6 pupil Sean Haycock. Mrs Guest described Sean as a very caring, kind, sensible, helpful member of school. Sean relates especially well to younger children and is always quick to help. He is respectful in all interactions with others and is highly regarded by both his peers and the school staff. He recognises effort and achievement in others and always displays an enthusiastic approach. Sean was a most worthy winner of this year's Citizenship Award, said Mrs. Guest, before asking village Neighbourhood Watch secretary Joe McKenna to present Sean with his engraved trophy and framed certificate to record his achievement.

Sedgefield Primary School

On Wednesday 22nd July, before the Leavers' Ceremony, acting Head Teacher Sandra Marks reminded everyone of the background to this special Citizenship award, of the contribution made by the many volunteers in society like Alan Sowerby, who this award commemorates. Sandra described the importance of the values required from a pupil to enable them to be considered a good citizen and how important these attributes are for everyone both during school and outside school. She described how one name seemed to leap out to her when she initially thought about the selection for this year's award and wondered who other members of staff might be considering. It was with great surprise that she had discovered a unanimous first choice and that name was the one that had leapt out to her. At this stage of the proceedings all eyes were now directed towards one pupil and Sandra Marks confirmed that the winner of Citizen of the Year 2009 was indeed a very worthy and commendable George Peden. Sandra then called upon village Neighbourhood Watch secretary Joe McKenna to present George with his personal engraved trophy and framed certificate to record his achievement.

Footnote: Sedgefield village Neighbourhood Watch members feel it is a privilege to provide the Alan Sowerby award each year to recognise the achievements of the children who attend the village schools. - To increase the sense of belonging in a community, to meet and help other people.
 - To inform people in the area of all the issues that affect them.
 - To get involved with what other groups may be doing.
 - To have a representative voice on groups/committees such as Community Empowerment Networks, CAVOS etc.
- The only thing from this list that the Forum have not engaged in is arrange outings and social events; we believe there are many other groups in the village doing such activities and the Forum have no wish to duplicate activity.

To turn now to the criticism that the Forum is always against things. By the very nature of the organisation, residents predominantly present issues of concern to them i.e. something they want to stop happening. When there is a clear, overwhelming, majority view on an issue from residents e.g. the caravan park, the Forum will represent that view. Where there is divided opinion, as was the case on the secure mental unit and wind turbines the Forum tries to represent that view. However, the Forum will always offer individual residents help and support on any issue they may have.

The Forum is not always negative, in fact it has praised and acknowledged some village initiatives, for example:

- Our local fire fighters for their service and expertise
- A local business for the 'rescue' and excellent improvements to the Manor House
- Our Town Council gardeners for wonderful floral displays and maintenance
- Recruiting volunteers to take forward youth provision.
- And of course to our residents who have pride in our village and give their time to try to maintain standards.

Residents' organisations throughout the country fluctuate in size and capability and can only respond to the voice and views of their community. The really important fact is that such organisations are in existence ready to offer, when required, help and support to the local community and residents.

The Forum meets on the first Monday of each month in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall at 7 pm. Everyone is welcome – you don't have to have an issue to bring – just come along and hear from your fellow residents.

SPORTS UPDATE

As far as I'm aware, technically it is still summer. So, despite the unpredictable weather, it is a very busy time for sports like cricket, tennis and athletics. As I type this, both the Ashes series and the World Athletics Championships are reaching their conclusion. I won't linger on the former, lest I tempt fate (I'm on a train heading to London for day three at the Oval as I type this), while the latter have been dominated by the astounding exploits of Usain Bolt.

However, there have also been encouraging signs from British athletes that could bode well for the 2012 Olympic Games in London. The undoubted talent of Phillips Idowu has finally been realised and Jessica Ennis has long been tipped for the top, but several other competitors stepped up to the mark with great performances that could be the start of something special. Along with others, the likes of Jenny Meadows, Marilyn Okoro, David Greene, Will Sharman, Greg Rutherford and Mo Farah all demonstrated great promise and could be genuine medal contenders in the near future.

But despite the recent prominence of summer sports, it is impossible to avoid the fact that the football season has started, so along with the high profile clubs in the region, Sedgefield's Sunday league teams are back in action. I'll bring early updates on progress in a future month. For the moment, I'll start with a preview of the rugby union season, which is also about to kick off.

Sedgefield RFC

As Sedgefield RFC prepares for a third season, the club is expecting a tough but successful year, having joined the South Durham League. The team's first opponents will be South Tyneside College on the 5th September, a tricky away match to get the campaign off and running. Sedgefield are hoping that all of the pre-season training carried out by their qualified coach will pay dividends.

With a busy fixture list, the club is always on the look out for new members, be they players or behind the scenes support. In particular, Sedgefield is keen to attract a match day reporter/photographer and a physio. "The reason I'm doing this is to raise funds for one of my son Alex's charities, Butterwick Children's Hospice. Alex was badly starved of oxygen at birth and is, as a result, very severely disabled, requiring total care for 24 hours of every day. He gets two weeks a year at the hospice, providing respite for me and my wife Johanne. The hospice provides top notch care, including hydrotherapy and a sensory room. Basically, they pamper Alex from when he arrives to when he leaves."

Anything that Carl raises should go towards funding a new sensory area in the main living area of the hospice, which will cost around £5k. Sedgefield Harriers

It has been said that running is akin to hitting your head against a wall – it's something you can't enjoy doing, but it feels good when you stop! There are not many regular runners that would disagree. Finding the motivation to get out of the house in the evening – or at any other time – is no easier for regular runners than for those who would like to get started. But it's seldom that you hear a member of the Sedgefield Harriers say that they wished they hadn't turned up once they have completed a training session. The good feeling that follows after some positive exercise is what gets runners to get their trainers on the next time.

There are usually about half a dozen runners at this session and by the time they return at 8.30pm there is a general glow of well-being.

This is not a session about which to be frightened. There are a number of regulars who were trailing at the back of the group when they first came along but who now cope well. No-one gets left behind and there is mutual encouragement. For seasoned runners and novices alike there is a unanimous feeling that they achieve more and enjoy the experience more when they run in a group like this. Another upside is the opportunity to take in some of the wonderful scenery that we have around Sedgefield during a run. The paths across the golf course, around Hardwick Park or down to Foxton, all make the miles pass quicker, particularly in company. Expensive trainers, Lycra shorts or technical running tops are not necessary either. Tracksuit bottoms and baggy t-shirts are just fine. The excuses are really running out, so if you are at all tempted, get yourself along to the college on a Wednesday evening soon.

Back at the more competitive end of the Harriers' programme, the club stages its annual Serpentine Trail Race on Sunday 13th September. The race starts in East Park and takes in tracks and trails around the Serpentine, out around Bishop Middleham and back across the golf course and around the lake in Hardwick Park before finishing in East Park. The distance covered is about 6.5 miles and the race is open to everyone (17 and over). Is this fair? You decide!

Once again I have been perusing the Town Council Annual Report and Accounts and I must say they do make interesting reading. There has been a lot of activity within the village over the past year couple of years. What with the refurbishment of the Parish Hall and now Ceddesfeld, we really are moving into the 21st Century. I take my hat off to those who have worked hard to enable this to happen. I am a volunteer myself and know how hard it can be to raise money and the unseen work that volunteers put into a project.

Sadly I write this with some cynicism, as all is not as rosy as it seems. As you know I was extremely supportive of a total re-build of the Parish Hall, purely because I wanted this village to have a state-of the art building which would be eco-friendly, built to modern specifications and accessible to all. Clearly this is not the case and never will be, as the building stands today. Nevertheless, this decision was the wish of the people of Sedgefield when they voted in the referendum not to go down the route of new build. I seem to remember the figure quoted for this refurbishment was approximately £80,000 and from what I can remember a possible loan sanction of £80,000, although it was unclear whether both amounts would be required. I personally read it as only the one. Clearly people were swayed by the lowest estimates for spending to negate the possible rise in their Council Tax.

However since that time the costs associated with the Parish Hall have been much greater, just as many of us expected. The refurbishment was funded by two applications to the LIP Fund, which were both successful, giving a total of £117,000 together with a large donation from Cllr David Brown from his Borough Council MIF and additionally a loan of £93,000; sum total approximately £227,000 apart from other public donations.

Just months before the referendum a large amount of public money was spent by the Town Council on a planning application for Ceddesfeld Hall, the minutes (Dec '05) showed ongoing costs stood at £33,859, so the final total was obviously more than that, presumably taken out of balances? By January '06 the application had been withdrawn! As far as I am aware no one has ever been held to account or even ventured to explain to the community tax payers, why a lot of public money was clearly wasted on this application.

Though the plight of the Parish Hall was discussed weekly by the Town Council and other groups set up for the purpose there was never any money available in the budget for the Parish Hall. I am still trying to trace the £4326 left over from one of the parish hall groups, which was lodged with the SCA and ring-fenced for Community Development. It has never appeared in the SCA Accounts, at least not the ones I have access to. Imagine my surprise when I read that this year 2008/09 the SCA came cap in hand to the Town Council requesting financial assistance towards capital works for improvements to Ceddesfeld Hall, especially after their generous grant of £104762.00 from LIP and the contribution from Cllr Robinson of his share of the Borough Council MIF monies which amounted to £20,000. So where had their estimates gone so wrong? It seems like déjà-vu with the Parish Hall finances, clearly somebody got those estimates completely wrong too. But it's just our money so who cares? And let's not forget the balance sheet of the SCA which as of 31st December 2007 stood at £160247.00.

At their November 2008 P&R meeting, the Town Council agreed to give the SCA a Grant, **not a loan**, of £25,000 payable over three years. WOW, we seem to be awash with money but what's this, we certainly can't afford to give the Lyric Singers a grant of £600 to cover the costs of Parish Hall staging to replace that which used to belong to the Lyrics and was kept under the stage. OOPS! They forgot to provide storage for these and other equipment when the refurbishment took place. The Lyrics were asked to forward a full set of audited accounts in view of the large amount of money being requested. The decision was adjourned until the next meeting, which incidentally made it the same November meeting where the grant to the SCA was approved. Guess what! Computer says NO! The Lyrics were awarded **£200** towards the staging equipment. (5.4.3) The SCA were awarded **£25,000**. I rest my case. *Gloria Wills*
